

THE RUSSO-JAPANESE WAR.

The irregularity and hap-hazard in connection with the mails of late makes Centre, spent Sunday at Mr. S. Scott's. it impossible to get a clear account of Mr. Angus McDonald, of Topcliff, events. However under the best conditions, no clear account seems possible spent last week visiting Mr. John A. from the contradictory nature of the despatches. All that is clear is that Japan has command of the sea, is not succeeding quite so well on land, and that Russia is massing her forces and not trying anything very aggressive as yet.

Since writing the foregoing, later mails have arrived. A sensational despatch tells of a fleet of Japanese war ships shelling Vladivostock, but without drawing a reply. It is suspected the fleet is out marauding Japanese mer-Mr. and Mrs. Herb. Watson, of Price- chantmen, or, some think, may be steaming for Europe for safety, until Russia can send out greater naval strength. If it intends to return to port, there will be another fight : if it Miss Mae Dickenson, Messrs Fax, doesn't, Vladivostock is shut up as tight as Port Arthur.

Not only shut up, she may be cut off by land and sea, for a detachment of Japs has been landed at Possiet Bay, Hanover and from thence by train to some distance to the south, and are marching inland in the direction of the railway from Harbin to Vladivostock. As no adequate Russian force is in the neighborhood the railway will surely be weather. During their stay they were wrecked, and succor for the seaport will be difficult to get.

The Japanese army is rolling north over Corea 50,000 strong at least, and a big battle can not be long delayed. Japan can land supplies over hundreds of miles of sea coast, having thus an immense advantage over Russia. who has to transport them long distances.
