### BENTINCK COUNCIL.

The second session of the Bentinck Council for the year 1904 was held in Elmwood on Monday the 13th Feb. at 10 a. m. Members all present. Reeve in the chair. Minutes of Jan meeting read and passed. The committee on Treasurer's reports reported same as good and satisfactory. Report ordered to be received and comm. paid \$1.50 each for their services, also \$1 to the Registrar of S. Grey for search. The auditors presented their report which on revision by council was ordered to be received and adopted, and abstract thereof printed, and auditors paid \$5 each for services. Applications for the office of Assessor received from Robt. Brigham and Moses Jacklin. Mr Jacklin was appointed at a salary of \$70 including equizing of union school sections. By-law No 2 for 1904 appointing pathmasters, pound-keepers and fenceviewers was duly passed. Petition received from ratepayers of Elmwood asking that their statute later for present year be commuted at 75c per day. The prayer of the petition was granted and Jacob Kreuzweiser appointed commissioner. Petition received from Henry Brigham and others asking council to aid Widow Eliza Smith as she was in poor circumstances. She was ordered to receive \$8 quarterly for her maintenance. Wm Hastie was appointed operator of the grader for current year at a rate of wages of \$1.00 per day of 10 hours work. The sum \$5.95 was granted to Elmwood Public Library. Dr Cook's account for attendance on McConnell and others was not entertained. The following accounts were ordered to be paid: Mum World \$4.35, for Assessor's stationery; Frank Cronin \$8.80 for work which was performed on town line B & B; Treasurer \$100, his salary for 1903. Council adjourned to meet in Allan Park on the 28th day of May next as a Court of Revision and for the transaction of business.

### A SKETCH OF GLENELG TOWNSHIP. PAST AND PRESENT

Continued from last week.  
Council for 1872—Jas Edge, reeve; Jas. H. Hunter, deputy reeve; Hugh McFayden, James Lauder, Shepherd Boyce, councillors.  
S. B. Chaffey and Duncan McDonell were appointed auditors. Wm Morrison, Assessor, salary \$70. Auditors were paid \$12 each for their services.  
Moved by H McFayden, seconded by S. Boyce that mileage be struck off councillors' remuneration. Carried.  
Special meeting of council held June 22nd, 1872. On motion made and seconded it was resolved that dep.-reeve J. H. Hunter be authorized to represent the council at a railway meeting to be held in June at some future date. John S. Black was appointed collector for 1872 at a salary of \$95.

By-law granting \$5000 to aid the building of a railway to Durham was voted on the 7th of December 1872. Special meeting was called by the reeve to meet at the Revere House in Markdale on Dec. 30, 1872, to consider the railway by-law, &c. The clerk handed in his certificate certifying that the total number of votes polled was 475, of which 414 were in favor and 61 against, showing a majority of 353 in favor of the railway. Signed James Brown, clerk.  
Council for 1903—Jas. Edge, reeve, J. H. Hunter, dep. reeve; Patrick Neil, James Sullivan, Hugh McFayden, councillors. James Banks and Duncan McDonald were auditors. Wm Jackson, assessor. [This is Mr. Wm. Jackson of the Glen, near Bunesan, who is hale and hearty yet. Although not long out from his native country, the council recognized him to be well-fitted for the position.] C. Williams was appointed tavern inspector.  
The reeve gave notice that at the next meeting of council he would introduce a by-law to have the township divided into four wards for the purpose of giving each ward an opportunity to elect a councillor for same. A general vote for the election of the reeve.

The clerk was paid \$10 for making an extra copy of the Assessment Roll. Jno. S. Black was appointed collector, salary \$95.  
Council for 1874—J. H. Hunter was elected reeve defeating Mr. Edge. Each ward elected their own councillor as follows: Thos. Whitmore, ward 1; John McDonald, ward 2; Wm. Morrison, ward 3; W. J. McFarland, ward 4. Morrison was elected deputy-reeve by his fellows.

A keen contest was noticeable for each ward. Mr Whitmore defeated Mr McFayden in No. 1; John McDonald defeated Patrick Neil and Jas Sullivan in No 2. Here we must say that if Mr Neil got justice he was elected by one of a majority, as McDonald & Sullivan tossed up as there were about half a dozen votes to be divided between them the lot fell on McDonald and elected him by 5 of a majority. John A Lamprey and Archibald Black were appointed auditors for 1874. Alex McKechnie was appointed assessor at a salary of \$75. Councillor Kerny's beautiful residence is on McKechnie's farm as he is now proprietor of the place.

In the year 1874 the sum of \$7500.00 was received from the Municipal loan fund debt. It was moved by Mr McFarland seconded by Mr Morrison that the Municipal Loan Fund be wholly appropriated towards the improvements of roads and bridges throughout township and that a by-law be passed for that purpose. Carried.  
Moved in amendment by Mr Hunter, seconded by Mr McDonald—That the taxes for the present year be reduced by applying so much of the Municipal Loan Fund as will be sufficient to cancel the rate to be levied on account of railway indebtedness and that the balance be applied towards the improving the roads. Lost.  
Yeas and nays called for—Yeas, McFarland, Morrison and Whitmore. Nays, Hunter and McDonald.

John S Black was appointed collector at a salary of \$95.  
The council went into committee of the whole, Mr Morrison in the chair. The following is the report—Your committee beg to report that having examined the amounts expended in this township during the year out of the surplus fund, find that the following sums have been spent in the different wards:  
Ward 1, \$1727.82. Ward 2, \$1841.84  
Ward 3, 2063.97. Ward 4, 1936.19  
making a total of seven thousand, five hundred and sixty nine dollars and eighty two cents.

After a vote of thanks tendered to the reeve the council adjourned for that year, some of them never to return again.  
Council for 1875—J H Hunter, reeve; Thos Whitmore, John McDonald, Shepherd Boyce and Wm Morrison, councillors. Moved by Mr Whitmore, seconded by Mr Morrison that John McDonald be deputy reeve. Carried.  
The reeve appointed Arch Black an auditor and the council James Banks, Hugh McColl was appointed tavern inspector.

Applications for the office of assessor asked for, up to the 8th Feb. The following applications were received and each councillor nearly had an assessor of his own. However the difficulty was solved in the following manner.  
Moved by Mr Boyce, seconded by Mr Whitmore that Edward Rutledge be assessor. Lost.  
Moved in amendment by John McDonald, seconded by Mr Morrison that

John S Black be assessor at a salary of \$75. Carried.

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Morrison, seconded by McDonald that John Cameron be assessor for the current year at a salary of \$75. Lost.

Messrs Whitmore and McDonald were appointed a committee to examine the 8th con., from lot 2 to 6, known as the Glencross bridge afterwards.  
At the next meeting of council they brought in their report that it would take \$500 to make any kind of a road possible to travel. The council thought the amount too large and no action was taken thereon. (We will give the cost of bridge built lately in future.)  
The sum of three hundred and two dollars and seventy five cents was accepted by the township of Glenelg, from the town of Durham, being the amount paid by the township on account of said town in the year 1873 under county bylaw 174.

\$96 was paid A. & A. Cochrane for road scrapers. John Black was paid \$169.00 for building a bridge known as Keyland's bridge, sideroad 40, con 2, N. D. R. The clerk's salary was increased \$20 on account of extra service.  
Moved by Whitmore, seconded by Boyce that Alex Bell be collector for 1875 at a salary of \$90. Lost.  
Moved in amendment by McDonald, seconded by Morrison that J S Black be appointed collector at a salary of \$95. Carried. Mr Black acted for two or three years as assessor and collector.

Council for 1876—Finlay McInnes, reeve; Dr Sproule, Thos Whitmore, John McDonald and T'os Townsend, councillors. Moved by Thos Townsend, seconded by Dr Sproule that Dr Sproule be deputy reeve. Lost.  
Moved in amendment by John McDonald and seconded by Thos Whitmore that Thos Whitmore be deputy reeve. Carried.  
The reeve appointed Arch Black, auditor, and the council appointed Samuel Donnelly the other auditor. An application from James Edge, Esq. for the office of Treasurer was read.

Moved by Dr Sproule, seconded by Townsend that Jas Edge, Esq., be appointed treasurer at \$60 per annum. Carried.  
Yeas, Townsend, Whitmore and Dr Sproule. Nays, F McInnes, Reeve and McDonald.  
Mr Hunter, the late treasurer, was taken by surprise as he had served faithfully for about 20 years as treasurer and did not get the opportunity of tendering his resignation. Mr Hunter on different occasions kept up the township's credit by applying some of his own money till the taxes were all collected. No doubt the venerable gentleman was getting up in years and would soon retire of his own accord. Mr Edge made the remark several times years afterwards that it was the meanest trick he ever did in his life, but that he could not help himself as he was asked to apply.  
John Cameron was appointed assessor for 1876 at a salary of \$76, Christopher Williams, tavern inspector. The council held their 5th meeting in the village of Priceville at M. Lean's hotel, now Mrs Butters. It is seldom that a township council cross the boundary line into another township, but it was done for a purpose on this occasion.

Councillor Dr Sproule tendered his resignation as councillor.  
Dr Sproule's resignation was accepted and Sam Donnelly was appointed for the rest of the term.  
\$10 was granted widow Seaton to pay the funeral expenses of her late husband who was killed by a tree.  
John S Black was again appointed collector for 1876, his opponent being Mr Bell as year previous.  
Council met at Ryan's hotel on Dec. 18th.

Lots of charitable grants made after which the council adjourned for the year, after the usual vote of thanks to the reeve.
