> -Notice of a bill to prohibit the cigarets was introduced into the Dominion House on Monday by Mr McLaren of Huntingdon and seconded by Mr Richardson of South Grey.

-The British House of Commons by a majority of 33 have supported the Balfour government in not disallowing the measure admitting Chinese labor to the Transvaal. The terms of their admission are little, if any, short of slavery and is in strange contrast to Canada's poll tax of \$500 to keep them out. First thing we know some Canadian employers of labor will want to have them bonded here. . The excuse in the Transvaal is the extreme financial depression.

THE PETTYPIECE BILL.

This measure, now before the Legislature deals with the taxation of railroads in Ontario on a basis much fairer than at present exists.
