THE GREY REVIEW - VOL. 1, NO. 1.

As we intimated a few weeks ago we had been favored by Mr John Graham with the first number of the REVIEW. We propose this week briefly to take a look over it in the company of our readers and recall a few things of the origin of this paper, now over 26 years old, of sturdy growth, and firmly established in South Grey.

The first publisher was Mr Joseph Townsend, now in Toronto. He had for some time previously been publishing the "Dundalk Guide," but seeing a better opening in this good town "pulled up stakes" came here early in 1878 and the first issue bears date of Feb. 14, 1878.

The editor in his introductory address states his position very frankly as follows: "In commencing the issue of a newspaper in the Town of Durham we do so with considerable hesitation. The times, and especially the circumstances of this town and the surrounding country at present are not such as to give much encouragement; still, as the want of a paper or a more progressive and liberal character than our respected contemporary, has been felt for many years, and as we flatter ourselves that we can supply that want, we thought our venture; hopeful that the GREY REVIEW may commend itself to the intelligence of our people, and enjoy a share of their patronage." He then refers to his political affiliations declaring his purpose to support the governments of Mr McKenzie and Mr Mowat as "he had for several years observed their able and honest administration of public affairs."

After promising that Agricultural and horticultural matters would occupy an important place in his journal, that municipal affairs would receive full attention, that there would be other attractive departments, he concludes: "In short it will be our constant effort and aim so to conduct the REVIEW that it will be a welcome visitor in every household in the County of Grey."

That Mr. Townsend endeavored faithfully to carry out his program old readers will admit. He was a good deal of a scientist,—perhaps more than a politician,—and many interesting articles, original and selected, appeared in his paper, and the interests of the town and locality received due attention.

So much for that. Now for a run through—the news—no, the advertisements, for the living interest that catches round a name is much more attractive than the news that were new 26 years ago.

Prominent on the first page R. McFarlane announces a large Stock of Cutters, good finish and best material, while Hestie & Grant, near by, are fishing winter goods off cheap, and offering special values in furs. Amongst the business cards we find F. McRae, Real Estate Agent; D. McDonnell, Barrister; Isaac Traynor, Surveyor, Draughtsman, &c.; Jos McArdle, Conveyancer, &c., and a number more scattered from Dundalk to O. Sound.

The well-known names of N. G. and J. McKechnie meets us in three places setting forth their ability to supply Lumber, Shingles, Lath, &c., as well as Groceries, Dry Goods, Flour and Oatmeal. J. H. Hunter had just received a large stock of clothing and had a "good black lustre for 12 cents," one of the few quoted prices in the paper. John H. Brown of the Victoria Tea Store announces greatly reduced prices "for Cash only after March 1st" as he is selling off. John Cameron's ad has an up-to-date look to present day eyes for it announces "Nagasaki Japan Teas" and had fine flavored Young Hyson at 50 cts, 5 lbs for \$2.25, and could give you a heavy quilted overcoat for \$7.00. J. W. Crawford, of "Rockville Mills" Bentinck was declaring "War! War!" against all kinds of saw-logs with the circular saw, and was selling lumber, &c., at "downhill prices." A whole column set forth the merits of the printing and publishing departments of the REVIEW office. Geo Russell had a large stock of Dry Goods which he was selling cheap, and E and A Davidson were making a special discount for one month. Geo Rutherford, of Dundalk, was evidently doing a pushing business as an Insurance, Loan and General Agency, and Bolster's of Flesherton wanted you to buy Books, Stationery, Biscuits, Pipes, and Sewing Machine needles. A small piece of paper disappeared and possibly may have had some other names, but these show that the paper had a good start. Some have spanned the 26 years and are still actively in the harness, others have left the busy scene, and many new men are on the stage.

THE LATE EZEKIEL ALDRED.

We have been furnished with the following sketch of the above deceased gentleman, whose death we noticed in the REVIEW of two weeks ago, and which took place at the residence of Mr J. W. Blyth, Varney, his son-in-law on Wednesday, Feb. 24.

Ezekiel Aldred was born in Covehithe, Suffolkshire, England, on 10th October, 1819; and came to Canada in 1835. His people were farmers, but on reaching Montreal, he learned the tanning trade.

After some years he moved to the Western province and helped to fell the first trees on the opening of the Owen Sound Road. He settled in Bentinck, near Durham, was married 15th Sept., 1844, to Mary J. Sur, and except 4 or 5 years spent mining in Brit. Columbia about 1850 years ago, was here or near it till his death. His wife died in 1868 four years after celebrating their golden wedding.

To these pioneers were born 10 children of whom the following survive: Mrs. Stewart Fleming and William in Summerbury, Assa; Mrs. Jno. Mitchell, Grenfell; Mrs. Alex. Constable, Barrie; Mrs. Vanalstyne, Montreal; John, on the homestead; Mrs. Harry Burnett, in town and Mrs. J. W. Blyth, Varney. Three brothers survive him: Capt. Wm. Aldred, Windsor; Samuel in Colorado; John in Nova Scotia and two sisters, Mrs. Watson, Toronto and Mrs. Francis H. Ribey, North Bruce, Ont.

Mr. Aldred was a faithful member and class leader of the Methodist church for over 40 years, first in Durham, then at the Grassy Church, Normandy, to which he was a large contributor, and latterly at Varney. He bought and gave a free deed of the land for the Varney Church. He was also an enthusiastic member of the Orange body for 45 years, having taken his degrees up to the Scarlet. He wished to be buried under Orange auspices and this was carried out. In politics he was a supporter of the Conservative party.

He was kindly and obliging as a neighbor, hospitable to strangers and seldom was a tramp turned from his door. During the two last years of his life he was an invalid and received the kind and unremitting care of his daughter and son-in-law. He was buried beside his wife in Maplewood cemetery.
