MISSIONARY SERMONS.—Rev. Mr. Far-
quharson devoted last Sabbath largely
to Foreign Missionary work, especially
in China, and had collated an immense
amount of interesting information rela-
tive to the people, their social habits,
customs, &c. all going to show that Mis-
sionaries have no easy task in going a-
mong a people with the masses in deep-
est poverty, with duplicity everywhere,
and ideals and modes of thought entire-
ly different from ours. It is striking
testimony to the power of the Christian
message, that in the Boxer troubles, so
many of the converts showed the spirit
of the martyrs, and suffered, even to
the death, for the new faith.

THE LATE R. J. DIXON.—On Mon-
day of last week the above gentleman
died in Mt Forest as a result of an
operation for appendicitis several days
before. His wife is a daughter (Helen)
of Mr and Mrs Jas. Isaac, near Dromore,
and a sister of Mrs Hugh Baird, Laur-
iston, Glenelg, Mrs. David McIntyre
and Mrs. Jno. Bunston, Egrement. To
the widow and bereaved relatives, the
REVIEW extends all sympathy in this
sudden and sore bereavement. The Mt
Forest Confederate has the following
appreciative sketch: "The deceased
was the son of Mr John Dixon, Egre-
ment. On the 4th of June, 1902, he was
married to Miss Helen Isaac, who is left
to mourn the loss of a kind and loving
husband. He is mourned sincerely by a fond
father and mother, and by four brothers
and one sister, and by all who knew
him, for he was a general favorite. His
character was beyond reproach and his
hope in Christ was steadfast to the
end. He took a deep interest in re-
ligious matters and he had done earnest
and effective work in the Church, the
Sunday School and Young People's
Societies. His earnest desire and hope
had been to enter the Christian ministry
and he was residing in town with the
purpose of qualifying to enter the
Presbyterian College in Montreal.
The week before his illness he preached
at three appointments. He is now
called to higher service."

TOPIGS OF THE WEEK

—The German Emperor is touring
the Mediterranean and is at present
being idolized in Italy. It is reported
that he is trying his best to get France
into the mix-up.

—Premier Ross has apparently given
way from his personal attitude for
government control of the liquor
traffic, moved thereto no doubt by the
reported action of his followers in
caucus, who declined to follow him.
It is reported that after the Easter
recess a measure will be introduced
providing new amendments to the
License Law, which will, of course,
please neither party-prohibitionists
nor liquor men: It seems rather a
humiliating offering to lay before the
200000 voters of the Referendum but
one cannot get away from the fact,
that if that vote was all as honey-
combed with hypocrisy as Centre
Bruce was proved to be,—and there is
reason to suspect it—there is not the
moral necessity laid upon any party
to legislate in their favor. Still we
think Premier Ross would have been
wiser had he stood by his guns, and if
fall he must he would have gone
down gloriously and in good com-
pany. We quote, elsewhere the burn-
ing words of Drs. Caven and Carman
on the eyesore of the bar.

—The Legislature had an all-night
sitting on Monday evening. Dr. Beattie
Nesbitt pressed a motion for a 2 ct.
railway rate on the House when the
Liberals were found in a minority.
An amendment by the Liberals on the
same lines furnished opportunity for
debate to state off a vote till members
who had missed the train arrived.
This is one of the evils and the inci-
dents of a small majority.

—After years of clamoring for the
privilege of having, if thought desir-
able, a Canadian officer in control of
our Militia, the Conservative party
has decided to condemn the proposal
apparently because the Liberals are
adopting it. We shall probably hear
the disloyalty cry raised.

THE RUSSO-JAPANESE WAR.

During the week there has, as usual,
been a lot of asserting and denying of
events. A prevailing tone of optimism
seems to be actuating the Russians
since Makoff took charge of Port
Arthur fleet. Japan still succeeds in
keeping down every ebullition of feel-
ing that would indicate success or
failure.

Admiral Togo has been trying again
to bottle up the Russian fleet, but has
failed, for they have flauntingly put
to sea, but so far have refused battle.
If they can keep intact till a union is
made with Vladivostok or Baltic fleet,
Japan will have a hard proposition.

The boasting Kouropatkin has ar-
rived on the scene, and is playing a
waiting game. Neu Chwang has been
seized by Russia and British and
American flags pulled down. This
rather clears the way for Japan, who,
it is thought, intends landing in force
near there.

Japan seems intending so many
things that a fear exists she is getting
rattled, or else she has some daring
move in view and waiting for signal
for concerted action over a wide
stretch. A report to-day (Tuesday)
that she has beaten the Russ in a land
battle but losing 50 killed.

Lake Baikal railway line will be re-
placed next week with the ferry.

THE WEATHER.

The thaw which began Tuesday of
last week continued till Saturday morn-
ing, and at intervals was accompanied
by rain dashes which made a great
change in the snow situation, though
of course leaving the roads in a miser-
able condition. Saturday the temperature
fell, and up to-day, Tuesday, has been
cold enough to arrest the disappearing
snow, and sleighing is still fairly good
we are informed for cutters and light
loads.

The thaw and rain of course caused a
rise in the river, but the ice, except in a
few places has not broken up. At the
Garafaxa St bridge some enormous
slabs have broken off and indicate what
possible dangers there is even yet, and
almost certainly would have been had
the thaw not been interrupted. The
gradual release may save the town a
bridge, and possibly also some private
property.

Cellars in the Calder Block and across
the street as well are being invaded by
water, causing trouble and anxiety
too, for the worst is not yet.
