It occurred at Doddsville recently, and these are the curcumstances as related by local newspapers: Luther Holbert, a negro, had a quarrel with a white man and following the usual Mississippi method, they exchanged shots, the negro escaping and the white man teing killed. The negro, knowing the penalty for killing a white man in that section, fled, of course, ac-companied by his wife, who had had no part in the quarrel. They were captured by the mob and this is what was done to them, according to the statement of an eye witness in the Vicksburg Herald-

When the two negroes were captured they were tied to trees, and while the funeral prayers were being prepared they were forced to suffer the most fiendish tortures. The blacks were forced to hold out their hands while one finger at a time was chopped off. The fingers were distributed as souvenirs. The ears of the murderers were cut off. Ho! bert was severely beaten, his skull was fractured and one of his eyes, knocked out with a stick, hung by a man nor woman begged for mercy, nor made a groun or plea. When the executioner came forward to chop of fingers, Holbert extended his hand without being asked. The most excruciating form of punishment consisted in the use of a large corkscrew in the hands of one of the mob. This instrument was bored into the flesh of the man and the wothen pulled out, the spiral tearing out big pieces of raw, quivering flesh every time it was withdrawn.

In old times concrete walls were built of common lime, sand, gravel, stone and rubbish. Now we have cheap "Portland" cement, instead of the com and durable as a rock.

The concrete wall is the dryest wall made. It is cool in summer and in winter no breath of cold air can get through it. An engineeer who made a study of the debris of the recent big fire in Baltimore reported that the solid concrete walls proved the most indestructible, coming through the fire better than walls of any

other material. The only objection to the concrete wal s its cheapness. It can be erected with out skilled labor, and therein is its of fense. Almost every well-to-do farmer in the country has his barn basement rolled and floored with cement concreet Many have concrete dwelling houses, and these latter are increasing rapidly. The work is done by common laborers or farm hands, and the farmer gets the best possible wall at a very small price. But in cities opposition to the concrete wall has checked its spread to some degree and inspectors seem to be trying their hand at the business of discouraging the

HOW FISH CHANGE COLOR.

A Proof That They Can Do So

An interesting study of the ability of fish to change their color was carried on at the Woods Hall Biological Laboratory last summer. The experiment is thus described in Harper's Weekly; "Changing color at will is a property of certain mammals, and it was found that in the fishes under observation it was possible when changes of surrounding conditions were made. The fish selected for the experiment A were common green killifishes or salt-water minnows (Fundulus heteroclitus) which ordinarily in daylight have a light gray color. This in the dark becomes almost black, as was demonstrated by placing the fish in a dark-lined dish. If the fish were placed in a porcelain bowl in the light it would become much raler, even though the illumination was the same. That the color was at the control of the fish was demonstrated by severing the spinal thers' clubs and the "settlement" advice cord of one which had undergone and help can do little to this end. 
