TOPICS OF THE WEEK

—Stern justice has been meted out to the ballot stuffers in the recent municipal elections in Toronto. Samuel Thompson, Frank Gray, Ab. Cohoon have each been sent to Central Prison for 2 years. These were D. R. O.'s; two of their poll clerks, Col. Gray (father of Frank) and Thos. Kerr have to spend one year in goal. Thompson's poll clerk, Durance, gets free as a Crown witness, while the fate of 6 others will be determined at the May sessions. Meanwhile several of the aldermen who were plainly benefitted by the frauds and who are suspected of instigating them, still keep their seats in spite of much prodding by the press. One of the D. R. O.'s—McGuire—has sought safety in Buffalo but may be extradited. There were pathetic scenes in court as the sentences were pronounced. Col. Gray is an old man and has fought for his country.

—The executive of the Lord's Day Alliance met in Ottawa last week in triennial Convention and the reports presented showed gratifying progress. The branches 3 years ago numbered 210, now 510; of these Ontario has 300 Quebec 31, Nova Scotia 32, P. E. Island 7, New Brunswick 17, Manitoba 47, N. W. Territories 35, British Columbia 21. The membership then was 8000, now 25000. A deputation waited on the Premier and the report says "The announcement of the government's policy gave them much satisfaction."

—An important treaty between France and England has been signed by which France, for privileges in Africa, relinquishes claims to the Newfoundland shore.

ONTARIO EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION

The meeting of Educationalists in Toronto last week was a very important one, representing as it does every teaching branch from the University Professor to the Kindergarten teacher, and includes what may be called the lay or business branch—the trustees. The whole body—300 or over this year, largest in its history—spoke of as the Ontario Educational Association, this year the sessions being held in the University. During the day the "Sections" met in separate rooms and discuss their own interests. Hence we have sections named Mathematical, Classical, Science, Modern Language, College and High School, Historical, Commercial, Public School, Home Science, Kindergarten, Training, Inspectors, and, last but not least, Trustees.

One feature occupying the attention of all this year was the consideration of a draft of proposed changes in the Public and High School Courses of study and in the Departmental Examination System. This was submitted by the Minister of Education at last meeting, and the "Draft" was placed in the hands of a "committee of 19" chosen from all the sections. The report of this committee—in the main agreeing with the own interests. Hence we have sections named Mathematical, Classical, Science, Modern Language, College and High School, Historical, Commercial, Public School, Home Science, Kindergarten, Training, Inspectors, and, last but not least, Trustees.

For several years past great importance has been attached to classical and modern languages in examinations and science men and others have complained. Now with one stroke the study of these it is proposed to make optional for certain grades of certificate, and it has been found that a subject not intended to be followed by an examination is apt to be neglected. In all the sections the question of retaining Latin as a compulsory subject received great attention, and in most of them the language of ancient Rome had many supporters. Even the trustee section was warmed up for, of its two members on 'The Committee of 19', one favored and the other opposed retention. Each of them were giants in debate, but the champion for retention carried the section with him by a large majority, and the General Association or Wednesday evening, when all reports were in, went the same way by 2 to 1. So Latin is recommended to be retained but with less ground to cover.

The reasons for and against this, we have not time to give here, but may return to other matters of a public nature in some future issue.
