

#### A FULL TREASURY.

A despatch to the Globe from Ottawa depicts the rosy condition of the national finances. It is simply astounding how the trade of the country has increased during the past few years. No wonder thoughtful Americans are Here is the despatch:

"The coffers of the Dominion are full almost to repletion, and there is no sign of abatement of the revenue. Money mark has apparently not yet been made.

For the nine months ended March 31 the ordinary revenue amounted to \$51. 303,567, which was four and three-quarter millions more than for the same period of the previous fiscal year, and \$18,-642,313 in excess of the ordinary expenditure. Over all expenditures combined there was a surplus of \$12,069.443. The ordinary expenditure for the past nine months was but \$993,000 more than for the corresponding period of the preceding year. The revenue from customs. excise and the postoffice shows a substantial increase in each case. There was a slight falling off in the revenue The Following Prizes will be offered: from public works.
