**DR. MARGARET McCALLUM MARRIED.**—The bride in the following notice taken from the Globe, is a cousin to Mrs. J. W. McKechnie of this town and of Mrs. David McCrie, Normanby. The very quiet wedding of Dr. Margaret McCallum, daughter of the late Mr. Jas McCallum, and Dr. Samuel Johnston took place at the Central Presbyterian Church, Rev. J. McNicholl officiating. The bride was given away by her brother Mr. Andrew McCallum, and was attired in her travelling dress of navy blue tweed, with toque of blue and white. Only the immediate relatives were present, and after the ceremony Dr. and Mrs. Johnston drove to the train and left for Buffalo.

TOPICS OF THE WEEK

—The jury who sat on the wreck case near Guelph, brought in a verdict mildly blaming the operator, McKinley, but severely censuring the G. T. R. for a faulty station, for a bad system, the "O. S. slips," and for insufficient help at stations. For instance McKinley 19 yrs of age, had only to attend to four telegraph instruments, attend to two telephones, sell tickets, check baggage, open and close switches, attend to the semaphores, give information when asked, and take care of incidental duties. On an average twelve trains a night pass by the station, consequently there is also sufficient work for an assistant.

—The seven protested election trials will be held in September.

—A law passed by the Legislature just closed will give general satisfaction. It is that that when a vacancy occurs, an election must follow within 3 mos., thus preventing such a delay as the famous N. Renfrew case.

—Nearly 500 prohibitionists met in Convention in Toronto last Friday and voted down a proposal for Government control of the sale of liquor, but "expressed deep regret and disappointment that no legislation had been introduced in fulfillment of promises and in response to the demand of the electorate as shown in the referendum," also warned Governments and parties that the demands for adequate temperance legislation could not be longer ignored. The enthusiasm at the meeting presented a remarkable contrast to the apathy of the country as judged by Rev. Dr. Abraham, the Secretary's report. He had written to 475 active temperance workers and had received replies from only 45, though several had been written to 3 or 4 times without response. It was recognized on all hands that until the electorate rise above party ties there was little chance of ultimate success. G. F. Marter was elected President, F. S. Spence, Secy., Assessment Commissioner Fleming, Treasurer. An appeal to the Convention to wipe out a small deficit brought in a sum of \$1100.00, more than twice the amount required.
