**A GROWING TOWN.**—Assessor Elvidge  
made return last week of his assessment  
roll. The total assessment is \$640833.00  
an increase of \$20000 over 1903. The  
population as taken from his returns is  
1750, but Clerk Vollett assures us that  
without doubt it is now over 1800 and  
much of an influx has taken place this  
spring. The prospects are good for still  
more, and there is every likelihood that  
the assessor for 1905 may be able to re-  
port 2000. The population at the census  
was 1420.

**NO CHANGE IN THE DISTRICT.**—At

**VIGILANCE.**—Inspector Harris on Sun-  
day went west by Allan Park, Hanover  
and Neustadt, paying a visit to hotels  
on his way and as a result four or five  
proprietors have to answer for infractions  
of the License Law and in addition to  
fines may qualify themselves to have  
their license withdrawn altogether. A  
license is a contract between the gov-  
ernment and the licensee, by which for  
the privilege—i.e. the government—(i. e.  
the people)—has the right to with-  
draw it. It is these persistent attempts  
to defy law that gives strength to the  
cry for prohibition, and if hotel-keepers  
were wise in their generation they  
would keep clearly within their privi-  
leges. The sentiment of the best hotel-  
keepers and the public in general will  
support Inspector Harris in stamping  
out the crookedness or weeding out the  
crooks.

**TOWN COUNCIL**  
Met on Monday evening in regular  
meeting. All present.  
Mr S. McCracken called attention of  
council to sidewalk in front of his prop-  
erty, (Dr Hutton's residence), which  
needed support of some kind. Council  
granted him \$25 as part of expense of  
filling in. The necessity of more pump-  
ing stations on the river banks on which  
to place the fire-engine was recognized  
and the Board of Works are having two  
put in, one at the rear of the McKechnie  
store property, the other east of Gar-  
fraxa at bridge; near Calder block.  
Accounts were as follows: W Irwin,  
printing, 28.25; L E Elvidge, 1.00; H  
MacKay, commission collecting taxes,  
18.50; Geo Ryan, wood, 3.00; Hugh Mac-  
Kay, 3 mos salary as H Inspector, 6.25;  
C Elvidge, assessor, 40.00; W Laidlaw,  
expense attending railway meeting,  
10.00. Total, \$132.25.  
Petition of ratepayers east side of  
Bruce St for new sidewalks was ac-  
cepted.  
A request from the fire brigade for  
certain articles; hose, play pipes, ladder,  
Siamese coupler, br-ake, &c was com-  
plished with.  
Ed of Works was authorized to have  
retaining wall and sidewalk built from  
bridge to Middaugh House.  
On motion J P Telford was appointed  
engineer for all new sidewalks this sea-  
son.  
An important communication was  
read from M K Richardson M. P., show-  
ing the action he had taken in con-  
nection with extension of Lucknow—Han-  
over railway to Durham, in response to  
Clerk Vollett's letter from the town.  
The matter is to be considered on Tues-  
day of this week by the Railway com-  
mittee.
