PRICEVILLE CHURCH RE-OPENING.

Sunday and Monday last formed another landmark in the history of St. Columba congregation, the occasion being the re-opening of their beautiful church after undergoing renovation by the painter.

The services on Sunday were spoken of by all as impressive and helpful. Rev. Mr. Anderson, of Caledon, preaching able sermons both morning and evening to large congregations. Monday evening the social, musical and literary features were prominent.

As usual the ladies had well-laden tables of delicacies dainty and substantial, with willing waiters wearing welcoming smiles. Everyone enjoyed it and passed upstairs to receive in the kindest spirit sallies of wit or words of wisdom.

Rev. Mr. Matheson was chairman and must have been delighted to have around him his brother ministers of four denominations, an efficient choir from Flesherston Presbyterian church, and such singers as Misses James and McLean and Mr. Wm. Ramage.

The chairman in his opening remarks struck the keynote of the evening by referring with evident pleasure and gratitude to the excellent spirit that surrounded him in the congregation and looked upon it as an earnest of better things. Speaker after speaker congratulated pastor and people on the healthy harmony existing which was never better.

The choir, with the Sheppards for leaders, rendered some fine music, their shading and modulation being very good, but needing a few more male voices.

Miss Anna James sang a sweetly pathetic solo, the refrain being a child's question "Why is heaven?" and Miss E. McLean gave "The better Land," in a tenderly appreciative manner. Mr. Wm. Ramage gave Longfellow's "The Bridge," and in response to a very hearty encore gave the "Grave of Napoleon." He was accompanied by Miss Minnie Hooper, daughter of Mr. Abraham Hooper, Glenelg. Mr. Sheppard also gave a solo and being honored with an encore, repeated it.

We have space only for brief reference to the speakers. Rev. Mr. Thom made his first appearance in Priceville and opened in a facetious strain lamenting his unfitness for a tea-meeting speaker and made a playful sally at himself in giving the reason he left bachelorhood. In more serious strain he spoke of the blessings of such unity as existed among them.

Rev. Mr. Urquhart, Corbett, made one of the best speeches of the evening on "Loyalty." His address was both interesting and edifying. He urged them not to be exacting on their minister, to remember "His throne is the pulpit and not your drawing room, his language is prayer not the gossip of the district."

Rev. Mr. Hurburt, Baptist minister, deplored the prevalence of superficiality and showed how necessary it was for churches to be true to the purpose for which they existed.

Rev. Mr. Franklin, English church minister, at Ceylon, is a ready and effective speaker and with such Christian unity, but had small hope of the proposed union at present much talked of. The Bishops of the Church of England in 1887 proposed a basis of union but it had failed. The desire for union must spring from the people, "God works from the bottom upward." He had compliments for the Scotch for being loyal to their church, and reminders to all that we are too ready to aim at the great things along way off and forget the things near at hand.

Rev. Mr. Roach, Methodist minister, was more hopeful than the previous speaker. If the first attempt failed, the Methodists would join with the other bodies in discovering where they had failed and carry it triumphantly to success.

Rev. Mr. Buchanan, Dundalk, was delighted with the good things of the basement and surprised that with such choice articles they couldn't fatten up their ministers better. (Mr. B. is himself is of generous proportions). He has a rollicking fund of pleasant humor, constantly reminding him of "another story," all the while rubbing in some wholesome truth. He hoped they would see to it that their fine improvements were not hampered with debt. He came out strongly against the drink traffic—would "bash" it in the face, was hopeful of union, proudly presented the Presbyterian church as still greater of the ages, having been founded by Abraham, and continued a historic church to the time of the apostles and since by the "Laying on of the hands of the Presbytery."

A vote of thanks to all who had aided in making the meetings a success was heartily carried. A special vote was given Mr. Dougall McCormick who has been indefatigable in pushing to successful completion more than one improvement in connection with the congregation. Mr. M. acknowledged the vote appropriately and appealed to the young men to take hold of church work more generally.

The pastor's closing words acknowledged the kind spirit which had buoyed him up during the 6 years of his pastorate. He and they were entering on their 7th year of association and hoped they would be able to make still greater progress while time was theirs and gave impressiveness to the idea by reminding them of the uncertainties of life as witnessed by four funerals last week and before them another, a worthy worker of the church, Mr. Dougald McLean who had died that day.

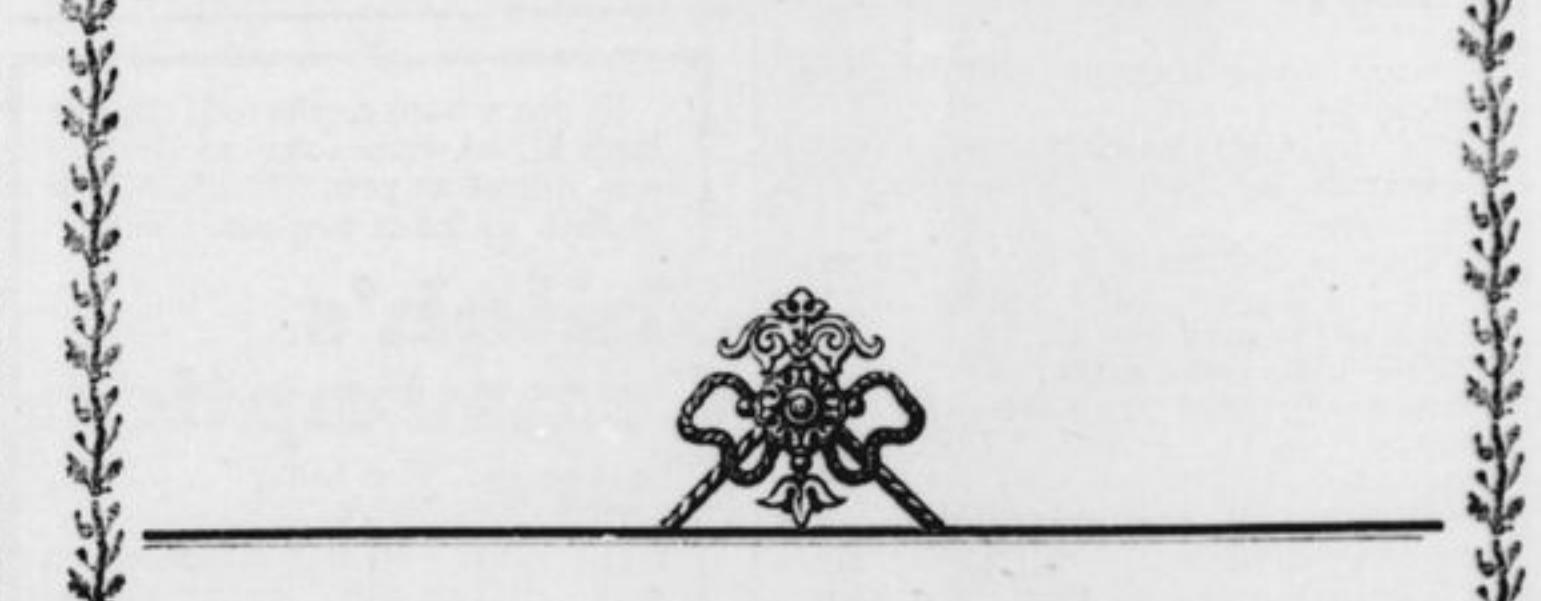
