A ROUGH FINISH.

About 200 spectators Tuesday witnessed the first match, or rather portion of a match, the Durham Lacrosse Club has played this season. Their opponents, the Aberdeens of Markdale, came here with the full expectation of victory, but although out-classed, made a creditable showing. Referee and C. L. A. 2nd Vice-Pres. Geo. L. Allan, Mt. Forest, lined up the teams about 4.15, while Mrs. Dr. Jamieson faced the ball. In the first quarter of the game, in fact, in all the game played, hard checking was in evidence, and the quarter resulted in Durham securing one goal. Glass scoring. Both defences appeared stronger than the homes, and some fair combination work was done on both sides, but all Markdale's efforts to score were foiled by Durham's strong defence. It was in the second quarter the trouble commenced. Graham, of Durham, was drawn in a scarp by an opponent, and a portion of the crowd rushing on the field, two or three more players and spectators participated in it, with the result that several cuts and bruises were made requiring the Dr's needle. Markdale refused to continue the game and Referee Allan reports Durham victors at present until the matter is settled by the C. L. A.
