Mrs. Neil McLeod.

Died on the 23rd of Mav, 1904, Mary Campbell, beloved wife of Neil McLeod, near Priceville, at the age of eighty-one years. She, in religion was a member of the Presbyterian Church. She was buried in Smellie's cemetery on Thursday. May 26th. The funeral was largely attended.
