PRICEVILLE.

Owing to so many obituaries we cannot give much of anything else this week. During the week before last, Rev Mr Matheson attended four funerals, and this week we have to give a short sketch of no less than four deaths which occurred during the last ten days.

Mrs. Neil McLeod.

Died on the 23rd of May, 1904, Mary Campbell, beloved wife of Neil McLeod, near Priceville, at the age of eighty-one years. Mrs McLeod and husband moved to the Durham Road, Glenelg, settling on Lot No 43, N. D. R. (now Duncan McDonald's), in January 1851. She, like a great number of her country people, had to endure hardships connected with bush life. She raised a family of 8 sons and 5 daughters, one son, Neil, having died over 20 years ago when a young man. Mrs McLeod was always pleasant and obliging in assisting in accordance to her means. She, in religion was a member of the Presbyterian Church. She was buried in Smellie's cemetery on Thursday, May 26th. The funeral was largely attended. A heavy shower of rain came when reaching the graveyard and a number got quite wet. Rev Mr Matheson officiated at the house and grave.

Mrs. Hales.

Mrs Hales, mother-in-law of Lachlin McArthur, near Priceville, died at the good old age of 85 years. She was a consistent member of the Methodist Church for over 50 years. She came to live with her daughter, Mrs McArthur, a couple of months ago, where she ended her life. She was a resident of Ardenia for over 50 years. She was buried beside her husband in Fleisherton cemetery, Rev's Wilson and Roach officiating.

Mr John Williamson.

Died at his residence on the Durham Road, Township of Ardenia, on Thursday, the 26th May, John Williamson at the age of about 70 years. Mr Williamson was well-known in his younger days in the vicinity of Durham. Later he moved to where he ended his days. He was in failing health for over a year. He was a faithful member of the Presbyterian church, and leaves a wife and family to mourn the loss of a dear husband and father. The funeral to this place on Saturday, 28th May, was largely attended, Rev Mr Matheson officiating at the house and grave.

Dugald McLean.

Few there be in the locality that did not know Dugald McLean, and now he is numbered with the great majority that has passed to the great beyond. Away back in the year 1849 Mr McLean and family left their native Isle, Tiree, in Scotland, to seek a home in the wild woods of Canada.

Coming to the township of Glenelg in the year 1850, he lived for a time on the north line, near Glenelg Centre. For half a century he was a resident of Priceville and was familiar with all the conveniences associated with life in a new country. He experienced adversity oftener than prosperity on his journey through life, and when closing his career he could say "I have fought a good fight and finished my course, &c."

Mr McLean was about 78 years of age and smart and active until a few weeks before his death, when he was seized with affection of the heart, which ended his life on Monday morning, May 3rd, 1904. In religion he was a Presbyterian and for 45 years was elder of that body, being elected first in the old Kirk in the year 1850. He was a man that dearly loved his mother language, the gaelic, and few there was that had such a thorough knowledge of the scriptures as he had, for he was a man of great memory.

Of the four elders that were elected 45 years ago in the congregation of the dear old church of Scotland all have passed away. They were the late Allan Cameron, Arch'd. McBride, John McLachlin and Dugald McLean. Those of us that were hardly in the middle of our teens then, are now fast going down the steep grade of life.

Mr McLean was not conspicuous in church matters only but in other matters, such as Township and County Exhibitions. He took great interest in our Shows in this place and was always an exhibitor and took prizes in boots, shoes and other articles.

Mr McLean was a self-educated man, for not until he was over 40 years of age could he read either English or gaelic, but as he received some knowledge of the truth as it is contained in the Holy volume he saw the necessity of reading it for himself, consequently he went to work and taught himself to read in gaelic and English fairly well. Mr McLean was a lover of his country, a lover of his native and a thorough lover of his church language, the gaelic, and above all, a lover of his God. He leaves as his chief mourners, his aged partner, one son and 7 daughters.

The funeral on Wednesday, June 1, was largely attended. The body was taken to the church, which was crowded, when Rev Mr Matheson preached an eloquent sermon in gaelic as the departed one had always a strong desire that a gaelic sermon should be preached at his funeral. Rev Mr Roach made a short address in English. When all, after viewing the remains, proceeded to the cemetery and there laid to rest a familiar form. His aged partner stood weeping at the grave, where she shall soon join him, with whom she spent nearly 3 score years of her life. Thus ended the career of another of the early pioneers.

The sale on Saturday, the 4th inst, of the farm of Mrs McDonald, South Line, Glenelg did not come up to the reserve bid, consequently the farm was not sold, but is open for private sale.

Mr Donald McDonald is engaged for a time in Pomona Separate School, as the former teacher has not put in an appearance since Easter.

Mrs Neil McKinnon, (Post Mistress), of this place, returned home on Saturday last after spending a couple of weeks with her sister, Mrs Walker, of Toronto.

We thank C C McFarnden for his

prompt delivery of good seeds ordered from him some time ago.

Commissioner McArthur is this week on County Council duties at Owen Sound. Hector McLean, who got a rusty nail into his hand a couple of months ago, is slowly recovering.

Messrs Neil McKinnon and Johnnie McDonald, South Line, attended a friends wedding at Collingwood last week and report a very enjoyable time.

The Rev gentleman, who preached at the Presbyterian church re-opening on Sunday, May 29, (Rev Mr Robinson) was to be married on the following Wednesday, but nevertheless it did not hinder him from preaching a powerful sermon both morning and evening.

Mrs Wright, (nee Lizzie Simpson), and her niece, Miss Myrtle McArthur, both of Buffalo, are spending a while with mother and grandmother, Mrs Simpson, of this place.

Miss Jennie McDonald of Hamilton is home on the South Line, Glenelg.

Neil McLean, of the Sco, is spending a while with his father and father-in-law, Hector McLean and John McPhail, near this town.

We notice that our mayor, Joseph Ansum, has proclaimed June 21st for a civic holiday. We hope an enjoyable day will be spent.

As the editor did justice in giving an account of our church re-opening and entertainment, we shall not say anything about the matter.

Dr and Mrs Hutton attended the church re-opening on Sunday, 29 May. The collection plate thanks the Dr for his liberality, for he in his usual manner in other times, remembers Priceville in his contributions &c.

Mrs Rose and two daughters, are visiting the former's mother, Mrs McIntyre, South Line, for the last couple of weeks.

EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met May 27th, minutes approved. Com. Gordon reported completion of contract of Drevoy's bridge from 1903 by C Kirk and Mr Young.

McArthur-Ferguson-That Chas Kirk be paid \$25, and Mr Young 7, bal. of contract, and Comr. receive 1.50 fees.—Carried.

Order granted on recommendation of Comr. Gordon to W Bye, operating grader \$2.—Carried.

Comr. Robb reported facing piles, Russell's bridge by J Robb, cost 3.50; filling washout on Baseline by J Hunter, cost 1.50.

Ferguson-Gordon-That foregoing report be adopted, and Comr. receive \$1.0 fees.—Carried.

By-law 169 to increase the clerk's salary 15, passed.

Robb-McArthur-That Council form into a Court of Revision with the reeve in the chair.—Carried.

Members of Court subscribed to the required declarations. There was only one appeal, viz that of Jas H McDougall, Lot 8, Con 9, too high ass'd, reduced \$100. Names entered on Roll—D McKinnon, tenant, pt 21, Con 22; W H Hargrave, tenant, Lot 18, Con 21; W Haw, tenant, Lot 24, Con 17. These were all the desired changes.

Robb-Ferguson-That the Court of Revision now close and the Ass't Roll of 1904, as now revised be finally passed and Council business be now resumed.—Carried.

Gordon-McArthur-That the Assessor be paid \$55 on salary acc't.—Carried.

McArthur-Robb-That the reeve be instructed to deal with the lumber purchased for Dromore sidewalks in 1903, in the best possible way, as the reeve and villagers see fit, and report at next meeting of Council.—Carried.

McArthur-Ferguson-That this Council go into Committee to appoint a Treasurer, with the reeve in the chair.—Carried.

The By-law to appoint a Treasurer was read a first and second time. A consideration arose about the reduction of the securities.

McArthur-Gordon-That By-law 170 to appoint a Treasurer, be filled with the name of Alvin Durant as Treasurer, salary eighty dollars, be now read a third time, signed, sealed, &c.—Carried.

The reeve applied to have his dissent recorded to the passing of this By-law on the ground that the Treasurer's securities had been reduced from \$15,000 to 12,000.

By-law 171 to issue Debentures for Trustees of U. S. S. No. 15, Arthur, Egremont, Protion & W Luther, passed and publication of registration of said By-law be made in the Representative newspaper according to law.—Carried.

By-law 172 to appoint a man to operate grader, passed. The name of Wm Weir was filled in By-law, pay \$2 per day.

Ferguson-McArthur-That Thos and H Reid be paid \$5 for work on roads last winter.—Carried.

Comr. Robb reported on keeping Baseline open during snow blockade by Wm McDougall cost \$7.80.

Gordon-Ferguson-That report be adopted, order granted.—Carried.

Robb-Gordon-That P. McQueen be paid 50 cts over charge on statute labor in 1903.—Carried.

D McQueen certified to repairing a bridge last Dec, by A McEachern, Lot 27, Con 8, cost \$2.

Robb-McArthur-That an order be granted for said amount.—Carried.

McArthur-Ferguson-That \$200 be granted to each road Comr. to expend on grading and gravelling.—Carried.

Robb-McArthur-That the clerk be instructed to notify Tp Engineer to come and locate water course on Egremont and Protion townships as soon as possible.—Carried.

Ferguson-Gordon-That the reeve and Comr. McArthur be a Committee to examine the Registry office regarding the Treasurer's securities.—Carried.

Robb-Gordon-That the reeve and Comr. McArthur be a Committee to wait on all parties affected by the watercourse at Orchardville, and report at next meeting of Council. Carried.

BENTINCK COUNCIL.

Met at Allan Park on Saturday, 28th of May, 1904, as a Court of Revision on the present year's assessment, members all present. After making and subscribing to the oath of office by the several members the Reeve was appointed chairman.

There being no appeals against the assessment, the court after revising the roll adjourned, and Council met for the transaction of general business, the Reeve in the chair.

Minutes of February meeting read and passed. On motion the roll was ordered to be received by council, and the assessors salary of \$70 paid him. The following petitions were received: From R G Webber and others asking that Lyman's slaughter house be removed further from the public road than it is at present. After hearing Mr. Lyman it was ordered that he be allowed time till next fall to remove said house. From John D. Clark and others asking council to furnish the wire to make a fence along lots 36 to 41 on consideration. From Philip Schmidt and others asking that Wm. Schmidt be paid \$2 for winter road through his place.—Petition not entertained. Account against one Martin Connor of \$18.20 from Owen Sound. Hospital not entertained. The Reeve reported having let a new bridge at R Kennedy's to Mr Farrelly for \$900; also having expended \$12 63 on bridges. The treasurer presented his half-yearly report showing a balance on hand of \$2,792.19. Samuel Hopkins was paid \$2.40 for damages to furniture when fumigating the house after diphtheria. \$1.90 was paid municipal World for collector's roll. The Reeve and treasurer were instructed to borrow \$114.75 to pay for Elmwood commuted statute labor. The Elmwood commissioner was instructed to pay Henry Geisel \$1.50 for extra work in 1903. Pathmaster of division No. 70 was authorized to expend \$5 on roads received from timber sold. Mr. Willis, road commissioner, along with Mr. Bowland, pathmaster, were instructed to have road opened on cons. 2 and 3, S D R along lots No. 3. \$2.50 to each road division and \$25 to Elmwood were appropriated for road improvements. The Reeve also recommended the building of a new bridge at Eddy's mill, S L 10, con. 2, north. Before doing so the Council asked him to ascertain the cost of building the structures. Council adjourned to meet at Dorroch on August 1st next at 9 o'clock a. m. for transacting business and appointing a collector.
