#### THE DEANERY OF SOUTH GREY.

The Ruri-decanal Chapter of the Church of England for South Grey held its annual meeting on Tuesday last, 7th inst, in Christ Church, Markdale. There was a good attendance of clergy, all but one being present and the meeting was very agreeable and pleasant.

A celebration of the Holy Communion was held by the Rev. Rural Dean Ryan, B. D., who was assisted by the rector of the parish, Rev. J. R. Newell, an Episcopalian. All who were present received, which is an unusual thing.

The Chapter was called to order by the Rural Dean at 2 p. m. for the business session. After reading Holy Scripture and prayers the Chapter was formally opened, only one clergyman being absent, and he sent an apology. Rev. J. R. Newell was elected Secretary. The minutes having been read and approved, other important business was discussed. The resolutions passed included one relating to the payment of travelling expenses of all delegates to Synod meetings by increasing the amount of Synod assessments. This question is to be laid before the Synod at its next meeting by one of the other members.

The Annual Convention of the S. S. Association will be held at Dundalk with the approval of the rector and congregation.

Rev. Jeffrey Hill gave an interesting description of his newly formed mission. Upon the invitation of the Rural Dean the Chapter decided to hold its next meeting at Durham, concurrently with the Annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Rural Dean Ryan read an elaborate paper on "Distinctive Church Teaching," which was warmly praised. An effort is to be made to have this composition published for general distribution.

Votes of thanks to the Rural Dean, and for the generous hospitality of the Markdale congregation were passed. The Chapter meeting was closed with the Benediction.

A well attended service was held in the evening when Rev. G. W. Franklin said the Prayers, Rev. W. Hinde read the Lessons and the rector of the parish directed the Service. The sermon was preached by Rev. W. Hinde, now of Shelburne, a former rector, from Zech. 4th chapter: 6th verse. Many of his old friends were present to listen to the earnest words of their long-time friend. Cost.
