GLENELG COUNCIL.

The Council met May 30th and organized as a Court of Revision. All the members present, each member made and subscribed to the necessary oath as such member, and took their seats. Mr McCadden was appointed to the chair.

Appeals were heard and changes were made in the Assessment Roll as follows: Geo Staples and Richard Barker were entered as tenants for Lots 43 & 44, Con 3, E. G. R.; Arthur McCrie was entered for 1 of 29, Con 1, E. G. R.; Dan Robertson was entered for W 1/2 of Lot 8, Con 11; W Watterston was entered for E 1/2 of Lot 8, Con 11; W A Higgins was entered as owner for north halves of Lots 5 & 6, Con 1, S D R and separated from the Bell property; Randal McPherson was entered as owner for Lot 44, Con 3, N D R; Peter Muir was entered as owner for Lot 21, Con 1, N D R. With these changes the Roll was finally revised and ordered to be certified to by the Clerk.

After Court of Revision, the Council met for business. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: From the Treasurer, statement of receipts and expenditures with balance in Treasury; from the Committee on Irish Lake deviations, their report; from Thos Ritchie and 25 others, re-water course; from A McCaig, claim for damages sustained on defective road; from the County Treasurer, re Lots sold by the Crown; from Eugene Falls Water Power & Electric Company with draft of By-Law.

McMillan-Kerney—That the Reeve and Mr Davis be a committee to examine and take levels for the repair of road at Lots 61, 62 & 63, Con 3, E G R and if the cost is not too great, have the same repaired and made safe for travel.—Car.

Arrowsmith-Kerney—That the Reeve's Report to this Council re Frank McCartney, be adopted, and that this Council decline to assist the said McCartney any further.—Carried.

Arrowsmith-McMillan—That as soon as the House of Refuge is ready to receive inmates, this Council stop payments to those who on the charity list.—Carried.

Davis-Kerney—That the claim of Mr McCaig for damages by the upsetting of a load of hay be left over till next meeting.—Carried.

Davis-Kerney—That the account of J P Leford, Solicitor for Wm O'Mara, also the accounts of Dr Smith & Wm O'Mara be left over till next meeting, and that the Reeve and Mr Kerney be a committee to enquire into the case, and report to this Council at next meeting.—Carried.

Kerney-Davis—That the Report of the Committee re Irish Lake Deviations be adopted and that the Clerk be instructed to communicate with Artemesia Council to have occupant of Lot 28, Con 7, Glenelg, remove his fence off the road along the deviations to its proper place.—Carried.

Davis-McMillan—That the Reeve and Clerk be hereby authorized and instructed to execute a recovery or Quit Claim Deed for Lot No 36, Con 2, N D R as this Council can have no interest in said Lot having only the life interest of the late Ann McMillan.—Carried.

Kerney-McMillan—That the ward appropriations for the current year be \$150.00, for each ward.—Carried.

Arrowsmith-Kerney—That any person or persons cutting or removing shade trees or any other timber along the Public Highways without the consent of this Council will be prosecuted according to Law, and that a By-law be passed to conform this resolution and fix the penalty.—Carried.
