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EGREMONT S. S. CONVENTION.

This body met Wednesday of last week and was opened with devotional exercises. President Geo. Lothian presided in the chair. He gave a brief opening address, welcoming the workers and inviting all to take a hearty part in the discussions.

The report showed that in the townships or its borders there were 100 teachers, 12 schools, 450 scholars. Of these last 275 are church members, 41 had joined during the year, all use the international lessons and receipts were \$88.17.

Minutes were read together with copious notes on papers given at last Convention. Secy. Sinclair, before starting down reported for Yeovil, Mr. A. Tucker for Ebenezer. Amos reported 110 to 130, largest attendance 129, 8 classes, infant class of 30. Mr. Bradley, Orchard, said they had 50 names, average 35 to 45. Fair-bairn, like Orchard, had trouble getting teachers. Mr. D. Leith, Knox, Norway, reported a good school average 60 to 65, 9 teachers, 70 on roll. Mr. L. expressed great pleasure in being in his native church and meeting many old friends. Varney and Letter Green were not represented. Mr. Wm Allan reported for Union Sch. on 2nd Con., established 25 years, 90 scholars, 6 established 15 to 20 in Bible classes, interest kept up by prizes, Messenger and picnic. Money raised through Social, having no church to fall back upon. Rev. Mr. Little, Holstein, had 9 teachers, no difficulty in that respect, 100 to 130 scholars, 50 in bible class, collection once a month for missions. Mr. Woodland, Woodland, had on roll 75, average 50, 12 teachers, 25 in Bible class, gave \$10 to missions. Holstein Methodist S. S. was running smoothly, teachers 9, pupils 70.

Messrs Bradley, Leith, Dodds, Renwick, Tucker, were appointed a nominating com.

Mr. R. Renwick gave an able address on "The Normal Class in our Sunday Schools." Just as in secular education great benefit follows normal training of teachers so it is in S. S. work. The day of apostles had passed away, prophets had merged into pastors, but teachers we have still with us and rank next to pastors. There was necessity therefore for thorough equipment. A Christian character should be developed; teaching gives knowledge, training gives character. It is not what we know but what we do that wins the approbation of our blessed Master. He spoke of the benefit derived from a course of study, such as conducted by Rev. Mr. Campbell last winter, one of the best things yet introduced into the church. Certificates and diplomas are given out the work and the study were alone worth the trouble. All should take advantage of this Teachers' Training Course, prepared and conducted by the Gen. Assembly's committee; it meant work, but it was work that became growingly interesting. Mr. Renwick's paper was warmly received. Rev. Mr. Campbell, in response to a query from Rev. Mr. Little, gave some explanations. It was well pleased with the results. It was one of the best courses in our church.

Mr. Alfred Tucker spoke on "Lesson Helps: Their Use and Abuse," pointing out forcibly the danger of allowing them to supplant the Bible. Their chief value lay in the Historical and Geographical notes. Mr. Roland, voiced the sentiment of the Convention by remarking that help should be left at home. Get all the help possible out of bible, out of notes, anywhere, but make an earnest effort to make yourself master of the lesson.

Miss Naismith read a paper prepared by Mrs. W. H. Rogers on "How to Incent Pupils to make a perfect study of the Lesson." It recommended visiting pupils, getting the parents interested, praise for proficiency, give one line of the next lesson, stimulate them to get knowledge for themselves. In this the mother had a great field for "if noble sons are wanted we must have noble mothers," a quotation from Napoleon. Mr. Sinclair in the discussion emphasized the idea of giving credit for every lesson and thought it would be a good idea to study the lesson in the family. Messrs Randall and Phelps spoke on similar lines, and Mr. Geo. Lothian remarked that a home taught scholar can easily be discovered in the class.

Rev. Mr. Kendall, in the absence of Mr. D. Grier, took the subject "When and How should a teacher prepare the lesson." Two often times were left till Saturday night, or even "after doing the chores on Sunday morning." Mr. Renwick advised preparation Sunday previous, it becomes part of yourself during the week. Rev. Mr. Campbell advised a prospective study of several lessons. Messrs. Roland and Phelps, Mr. Jno Sharp, and the chairman took part in the discussion.

Officers for next year: Pres. Jno. Snell; Vice Pres. R. Renwick; Secy., John Sinclair, Yeovil.

Evening Session.

After a sumptuous supper had been served, the Convention resumed with a Song Service, led by the leader and members of the choir.

Mr. Roach, Priceville, spoke on the "Benefits of a Teachers' Meeting." Dr. Brown contributed a solo "I want to go there, I do," on encore he sang "Tell mother, I'll be there." Mr. Wm Isaac taking the tenor in chorus.

The offering being taken it was unanimously decided to give \$10 to the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto.

Rev. Mr. Little gave a paper on "Christ the Model Teacher," and very warmly and fully pointed out many excellent examples of Christ's methods. He was ever willing to teach even though weary at the well, a small audience did not hinder him from doing faithful work, he displayed wisdom in taking advantage of circumstances to illustrate Divine truth, he excited the curiosity and aroused the desire often good in his hearers, he avoided unnecessary disputes and went at once to matters of first importance, he dealt plainly with sin and brought truth home to the individual conscience, the great object of all his teaching, as ours should be, being the salvation of his hearers.

Dr. Brown again sang two solos, and was heartily applauded. The Dr's public spirit is as greatly appreciated as his excellent musical talent. The choir sang a couple of selections during the evening, finally all uniting in "God be with you." Rev. Mr. Little pronouncing the benediction.

Yeovil is the next place of meeting.
