**EGREMONT COUNCIL**

Council met July 9th, minutes approved. The Treas. and Clerk reported on taking inventory of books and documents of late treasurer and handing them over to the new treasurer, and pronounced the old safe worthless and recommended immediate action to purchase a fire proof safe. The report was adopted. The Treas. was paid \$2 and the clerk \$1 for their services. Three firms were represented on fire proof safes. After examining Cuts and deliberation thereon, it was resolved that we purchase from Goldie & McCulloch, Galt. Cost \$186 free at Holstein.

Robb—McArthur—That Comr. Gordon spend balance of money granted in 1903 on Proton and Egremont townline.—Car.

Application from school trustees, Holstein, asking Council to issue debentures for \$2500 for new school. Bylaw 174 to issue said debentures was passed, and debentures were signed.

Comr. Ferguson reported on work at Varney and cost and hauling of tile, cost of tile \$85.25, work and hauling tile \$7.35. Egremont half cost; paving Lot 9, Con 20, \$14; S Chapman, hauling tile, \$8. Report adopted, and Comr. was paid \$5, Commission fees.

Comr. McArthur gave a detailed statement of road improvements, &c., amounting to \$97.50.

Robb—Ferguson—That Comr. McArthur's report be adopted, and he receive \$5, Commission fees.—Carried.

Comr. Gordon gave a detailed statement of road improvements in his division amounting to \$55.10.

Ferguson—Robb—That Comr. Gordon's report be adopted, and he receive \$3 Commission fees.—Carried.

Comr. Robb reported on jobs in his division amounting to \$141.23.

Gordon—Ferguson—That Comr. Robb's report be adopted, and he receive \$5.50 Commission fees.—Carried.

Comr. Gordon reported on several small jobs amounting to \$27.00 and a culvert 66 ft long across O. S. Road cost of labor \$50, cost of tile \$20.38; Egremont half cost.

Ferguson—McArthur—That Comr. Gordon's report be adopted, and he receive \$5 Commission fees.—Carried.

Gravel and sundry accounts amounting to \$54.14, were paid; Com. tax \$7.43; tiles 126.83; freight on do 20.40; W. Weir, 1 1/2 days operating grader, 39.00; repairs to grader 16.19; Clerk's quarter salary 30.25; do postage and stationery 6 months, 4.50.

Adjourned to meet Sept 15th, to levy the rates, receive applications for collectors and general business. School Trustees will kindly forward estimates before that date. D. ALLAN, Clerk.
