A SKETCH OF GLENELG TOWNSHIP.

Continued from last week.

Council for 1879—Finlay McRae,
Reeve, Thos. Davis Deputy Reeve,
Patrick Neil, John A. McMillan and
Nathan Dunsnoor Councillors. Archi-
bald Black and Chas Moffat were ap-
pointed auditors, two good pursemen.
John S. Black assessor at a salary of
\$75. The council for 1879 saw that they
were destitute of a House of Refuge
in which to assemble & hold meetings for
municipal and other purposes. Conse-
quently some of the wise heads moved
and seconded that a town hall be built.
—Carried. Then it was moved by John
A. McMillan seconded by Patrick Neil
that the township hall be built on the
north east corner of lot 10, on the 4th
con., N. D. R., provided a clear title be
given for the quantity of land required.
—Carried. Moved by Mr. Davis in
amendment seconded by Mr. Dunsnoor
that the town hall be built on the south
part of lot 10, con. 7, N. D. R., provided a
deed will be procured.—Lost. Had the
amendment carried, it would certainly
have been more suitable for township
hall than where it is. Moved by Mr.
McMillan seconded by Mr. Neil that the
clerk be authorized to advertise for
tenders to erect a township hall, stables
and shed, and that a committee consist-
ing of Messrs Neil, Davis and the mover
be appointed to procure plans and speci-
fications for same.—Carried. The con-
tract was let to the late Robt Bull, of
Durham, for \$800 or thereabouts.

Council for 1880—Finlay McRae Reeve,
Thos Davis Deputy Reeve, Jno A. Mc-
Millan, Pat Neil and George Binnie
Councillors. The reeve appointed Chas
Moffat, Esq., an auditor, and the council
John S. Black, appointed assessor for
1880 salary \$75. Collectors for 1880,
Thos McGirr Ward No 1, Jno McDonald
No 2, Samuel Donnelly No 3, Isiah Mel-
loush No 4. Collectors for Wards No 1, 2
and 4 received \$25 each, collector for
No 3 \$30. Markdale included in No 3.

Council for 1881—Finlay McRae Reeve,
Wm Hall deputy reeve, Patrick Neil,
John A. McMillan and Wm Glenecross
councillors, Chas Moffat and Jno Lyons
auditors, John S Black assessor, \$75.

Council for 1882—Finlay McRae Reeve,
Thos Mullarky deputy reeve, Patrick
Neil, Nathan Dunsnoor and Wm Glen-
ecross councillors, Chas Moffat and Jas
Banks, auditors, John S Black assessor.
Council for 1883—Finlay McRae Reeve,
Thos Mullarky deputy reeve, Thomas
Davis, John A. McMillan and Nathan
Dunsnoor councillors, John Moffat and
Christopher Firth auditors, John S
Black assessor. Collectors for 1883,
Thos McGirr Ward No 1, W A Arrow-
smith Ward No 2, Thos Cook Ward No
3, John Hunt Ward No 4. Salary same
as usual.

Council for 1884—Finlay McRae Reeve,
John A. McMillan deputy reeve, Nathan
Dunsnoor Patrick Neil and Archibald
McCuaig councillors. The reeve ap-
pointed George Binnie auditor and the
council John McDonald for the big sum
of \$5 apiece. The clerk, James Brown,
Esq., tendered his resignation, of which
we give a copy.

To the Reeve and Councillors of the
Township of Glenelg:
GENTLEMEN,—Having served the
Municipality of Glenelg as Township
Clerk for a period of twenty five years,
I now tender you my resignation as
clerk.

I take this opportunity of thanking
you individually for your courtesy to-
ward me, and I shall remember with
gratitude the cordial relations which
existed between myself and the rate-
payers of Glenelg. Having spent the
best part of my life in discharging the
responsible duties of township clerk, I
feel it is time to make way for a young-
er man. I remain, gentlemen,

On motion of Mr Dunsnoor, seconded
by Mr Neil, the thanks of the council
were tendered to Mr Brown and his
resignation accepted, with the sum of
\$100 over and above his usual salary in
recognition of his valuable services as
clerk, &c.—Carried.

Moved by Mr Neil, seconded by Mr
McMillan, that John S Black be clerk of
this Municipality and that his salary be
the same as Mr Brown's.—Carried.

Finlay McRae, Esq., reeve, asked for
leave of absence three months: it was
granted. W H Arrowsmith was ap-
pointed assessor at a salary of \$80. Mr
McRae tendered his resignation as reeve
and Thos Davis, Esq., was elected to fill
the vacancy. Mr Arrowsmith declined
acting as assessor, and a special meeting
was called for the purpose of appointing
an auditor as the time was getting far
advanced that the assessor should be at
his work. It was thought necessary to
divide the township into two sub-divis-
ions, the boundary line to be at Bus-
ness being north and south. Thomas
McGirr was appointed for the west half
and John McDonald for the east at a
salary of \$40 each. This is the only
change in the history of Glenelg that it
was divided for assessment purposes.
However, the experiment worked very
well but never was tried since. Collec-
tors for 1884, Thos McGirr Ward No 1,
W H Arrowsmith Ward No 2, Thos
Cook Ward No 3, John Hunt Ward
No 4.

Council for 1884—Thos Davis reeve,
John A. McMillan deputy reeve, Arch'd
McCuaig, N Dunsnoor and Patrick Neil
councillors, Robt Edge and Geo Binnie
auditors. On motion of Mr Neil and
McMillan that Edward Rutledge be as-
sessor for 1885.—Lost. Moved by Mr
Dunsnoor and seconded by Mr Davis
that Alex Bell be assessor.—Carried.
Yeas, Neil and McMillan, nays, Davis,
Dunsnoor and McCuaig. A by-law was
passed fixing the treasurer's salary at
\$100 per annum. Collectors' same as
previous year. Moved by Mr Neil, sec-
onded by Mr Dunsnoor, that this coun-
cil grant a reward of \$100 for the appre-
hension and conviction of the party or
parties who entered Peter Neil's field on
Oct. 15 and broke his mare's leg with a
stroke of some blunt instrument.—Car-
ried. After the usual vote of thanks to
the reeve for his excellent services, &c.,
the council adjourned sine die.

Council for 1886—Chas Moffat reeve,
Archibald McCuaig deputy reeve, Geo
Binnie, George Lamb, and Christopher
Williams councillors, Adam Turner and
John Nichol auditors. Moved by Mr
McCuaig, seconded by Binnie that
John McDonald be assessor for 1886.—
Lost. Moved in amendment by Mr
Lamb, seconded by Mr McMillan that
Edward Rutledge be assessor.—Carried.
Collectors same as year before.
