CONVENTION AND TOURNAMENT.

Provincial Volunteer Firemen.

We are indebted to Chief Torry and his lieutenant, Mr. John Rose, for the following synopsis of the proceedings at Milton on Aug. 2. It was the 34th Annual Convention of the P. V. F. A. and opened in the Town Hall at 2 p. m., Pres. Smith, Trenton, presiding.

Rev. A. J. Bell, of Grace Church, opened the Convention with prayer and the roll of delegates showed: Trenton 2, Niagara Falls 5, Thorold 3, Merriton 2, Paris 2, Durham 2, (Chief Torry and John H. Rose), Acton 2, Milton 4, and one each from Smith's Falls, Wallaceburg, Woodstock, Hamilton, Midland and East Toronto.

Mayor Anderson on behalf of the Town Council, welcomed the visiting firemen to the Town, and hoped their stay would be one of pleasure to visitors and citizens. Pres. Smith thanked Mayor and Council for the cordial welcome extended the delegates.

It was announced that the Provincial Volunteer Firemen's Association of Ontario had been incorporated with head-quarters at Merriton, where next Convention is to be held.

Routine business was then proceeded with. The officers for the coming year being: Pres. J. Vanderluyck, Niagara Falls; Ist Vice Pres. S. Moffatt, Merriton; 2nd V. P. A. Stafford, Midland; Wm. Miller, Smith's Falls.

The tournament on Thursday, 4th inst., was a grand success. The procession, about a mile in length, was formed in the Court House square and presented a fine appearance as it marched through the principal streets to Exhibition Park. It was composed of: Milton Band, Fire Brigade; Town Council and officers of the Association; Acton Band and Fire Brigade, Paris Fire Brigade, Thorold Fire Brigade, 48 Highlanders' Band, Inter. Harvesters' Co's Fire Brigade, Ingersoll Band and Brigade, Merriton F. Brigade, Niagara Falls Band and from the same place came the Alert, H. & L. Co., Rescue H. & L. Co., Bender Hose Co., Hose and Steamer Co. and West End Co.

Arrived at the ground the tournament commenced with the fancy drill competition between Merriton and Thorold teams, the former winning with 91 points out of 100, Thorold 87. General admiration was excited at their fine appearance and perfection of movement.

The big event was the Hose Race, the prize for this being the largest. There were 9 entries and the test is to run out 100 yds of hose and put on pipe ready for water. The contest was remarkably close, Paris 1st, 49 sec.; East Toronto 49 sec.; Merriton 49 2/5th sec.

There were 7 entries for the Hook and Ladder race: the run is for 300 yds with ladder mounted on wagon. Time taken from start till ladder is raised full length and a man reaches top rung, 1st Alert, Niagara Falls, 45 sec.; 2nd Inter. Har. Co., Hamilton, 46 3/5th sec.; 3rd Paris 47 sec. These races were run on time.

Merriton was the best appearing Co., Ingersoll came longest distance. East Toronto Brigade was accompanied by Mayor and Council of that town, showing the great interest they take in their firemen.
