## TRANSPORTATION PROBLEMS.

### The Liberal Record.

We hear a great deal about the Tariff, the Post Office, and latterly of Military matters, and on all these points the Government can certainly take to itself much credit. But a look at what it has done for Transportation is in order.

To begin with, it extended the Intercolonial Railway from Lewis to Montreal and at once the periods of deficits was over. It became henceforth a business proposition.

A judicious subsidy secured the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway which developed the important Kootenay district. It was part of the bargain also with the C. P. R. that they would substantially reduce freight rates to the farmers of Manitoba and the West.

When the Government took office they found that at the rate of progress that had been made under Conservative administrations the St. Lawrence Canal system would not be completed for at least ten years. Recognizing the importance of the work in the interests of the country, and particularly of the Great North-West, the Government determined to rush it to completion. This was done and by 1900 a clear channel of 14 feet was available from the Great Lakes to Ocean ports in Eastern Canada.

By addition to the speedy completion of the canal system the Government has pursued a most vigorous policy with the object of cheapening and facilitating transport between the Great North-West and the Atlantic seaboard.

Great attention has also been directed towards improving the harbors on Lake Superior where the western grain is delivered by railways and transhipped: similar work has been done for the harbors of Ontario and Montreal and for the harbors for receiving, storing and shipment for ocean voyages. The ship channel between Montreal and Quebec to the sea has also been made safer by buoys, light-houses, &c., a matter of great national importance. The ship channel from Montreal to Laree was lighted at night during a portion of the past navigation season.

New Steamship services were arranged for between St. John, N. B., to Glasgow, Belfast and Dublin; between Montreal and Quebec in summer to Manchester; Halifax and St. John in winter to Manchester; Atlantic ports to France; Atlantic ports to South Africa. Then again ships built outside the British Empire were excluded from Canadian coasting trade unless upon payment of 25 per cent of their value for a license.

Railway subsidies, which formerly were a gift are now given on condition that the railway companies shall perform service by way of carrying the mails to the extent of a fair annual interest on the amount of the subsidies.

A policy also of guaranteeing the bonds of Railway Companies has been adopted and in this way railroads are built without real cost to the Government.

Discrimination in freight rates of Canadian Railways in favour of the Standard Oil Company, was stopped—and schedule arranged providing for equal treatment to all shippers.

The new Railway Act gives the people greater control over railways, removes substantial grievances of farmers in respect of fences, gates, cattle guards, and fires, and gives assurance of fairer and more uniform treatment to shippers generally.

The Railway Commission, now in the west, is a late instance of Government success in dealing with transportation problems. The good work done by Hon. A. G. Blair and his colleagues has already been seen and is an earnest of still greater benefits to come. Nothing less than government control in some shape will keep the railways in order, and there is certainly large room for improvement yet in the handling of both freight and express. The study they give to transportation problems and the advice they give will be increasingly valuable.

Above and beyond all these, their courage and faith in the country is shown by the enterprise of the great Grand Trunk Pacific, the Directorate of which was appointed only last week. We will have more to say of this later.
