FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

At a meeting held in Amos Church, Egremont, on the 7th inst., Rev. C. H. Vessot, Montreal, made an address showing the necessity of French Evangelization, and incidentally, the importance of supporting the Pointe Aux Trembles School, where the children of French parents may receive a religious as well as secular training.

His text was "Holding forth the Word of Life," the motto of the late Rev. Dr. McVicar, as applied to the Pres. College. The mental condition of the people was vividly portrayed and contrasted with that of Ontario. Their education was described as being of a meagre character, but gradually the spirit of liberality is spreading and being instilled among the people, through intermingling with others who have come under the influence of the gospel teaching received from such institutions. He ascribed his ability to show the great need of such work, as being perhaps due to the fact that his grandfather, 114 years ago, had for \$12.50, purchased a bible from a missionary at Niagara Falls, where he was stationed as a Hudson Bay Agent.

He closed with a fine peroration, describing his feeling of sadness on viewing the ruins of Louisiana, where the blood of so many of his fellow-countrymen had been shed. The cry of the soldiers had been "Canada for the King," yet he viewed the defeat as being the hand of Providence giving it into the hands of the great Anglonation for the spread of the gospel. The cry of the great Protestant Army of Canada should be "Canada for God."

Mr Vessot's father was a retired officer of the French army, and on coming to Canada, engaged largely in Missionary work among his French Catholic fellow-countrymen in Quebec province.

Rev. Messrs. Campbell and Little opened the meeting, by scripture reading and prayer and Mr Wm Isaac sang a solo during the evening.

A large addition is being made to the Pointe Aux Trembles School to keep pace with the growing work, and Mr Vessot is the accredited agent to help raise funds.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE.

President's Address—Mrs. Thos. McGirr

The following address was given at the last annual meeting, and though delayed somewhat we take pleasure in presenting it as a sample of what is doing in this worthy institution, whose next meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. David McCrie, Normanby, on first Thursday in Sept.

"As it falls to my lot to preside over the third annual meeting of the S. G. W. I., I may tell you of some of the work that this Institute is doing. During the past year we held quite a number of meetings. Last July we had two lady delegates, Miss Beam and Miss Roddick. They held five meetings in S. Grey. We tried to start a branch at Allan Park but failed, as we could not get any of the ladies to take hold and work. The meetings were fairly well attended. At Durham Miss Beam spoke on "Cheerfulness in the Home," and at Allan Park and Elmwood on "Butter Making." Miss Roddick also addressed the meetings and gave demonstrations in cooking deserts, meats, vegetables, making salads, etc. The Sec. and myself accompanied them to Elmwood, and we had a very pleasant and profitable time.

We held our annual meeting in Durham last year, and we had Miss L. Rose, of Guelph, with us. She gave us a splendid address on the work of the week. She just told us how she would do her work each day of the week.

We held meetings in Aug., Sept., Oct. and Nov., two in Egremont, one in Bentinck and one in Egremont. These were very well attended, and we had papers on different subjects at each meeting. The Question Drawer is quite an interesting feature at each meeting.

We sent a delegate to Guelph to the W. I. Convention in Dec., and she brought home an excellent report which was read at our meeting in Durham in Jan. It was a very stormy time and there were not many there but we had a good meeting. Several papers on home nursing were given, which were listened to very attentively.

We had one meeting this last month in Egremont. We find it impossible to meet in the winter as the roads are so bad and the members are scattered so far over the four townships. Now this is just our own branch of the Institute and I think the Secretary will be able to tell us about the other branches. We hope they are going on working and meeting with success. There is often a thought coming to my mind something like this: "I expect to pass through this world but once, and if there be any kindness I can show, or any good I can do to any one near me, let me do it now, let me not neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again." We should be up and doing what we can to help each other to make this life better and pleasanter.

The women of some countries are not thought as much of as the women in our own dear land. Here they rule their own houses and are counted of first importance. They have a great work to do. On them devolves the duty of inculcating the spirit of thrift. Thrift properly defined means care and prudence, making the best of things in the best sense. In this we should try and do our very best, for every little counts in home-making.

Women's Institutes have opened up a new field of usefulness for the women of the farm, so many subjects being dealt with that relate to the well-being of that which makes life not only profitable but enjoyable as well. There is something about the Women's Institute that brings us in common touch with one another. It seems to be the means of bringing about the old time sociability by removing that spirit of gossip and jealousy and giving something else to think about. If we do not make it the means of enlightening and broadening our minds it is useless to keep it up. A woman's duties are many; her possibilities are even more. Wherever her life touches another there she has opportunity. The young girl, who shall come to reside over the homes of Ontario, will be far better fitted to assume the responsibilities than were a majority of their mothers when they came to reside over the new home that marriage gave them.
