HORRIBLE WAR.

Japs Chase the Russians from Durham

Our inside pages give a full account of the desperate 10 days' battle ending last Saturday, the longest and perhaps the bloodiest ever fought by the human race. It easily beats Waterloo in the numbers engaged and in the horrible slaughter of human life.

Monday's news left the impression of two exhausted armies, the Russians retreating, the Japs in possession of the strongly entrenched Liaoyang and harassing the Russian rear. Tuesday's news shows the Russians in a rout for Mukden, leaving behind about 200 guns, immense stores of food and ammunition, much of it in flames, and from 16000 to 20000 dead and wounded. Nearly parallel with them on the east a force of Japs under Kuroki is trying to reach Mukden before them!! Should Kuroki succeed, the beaten and dispirited Russian army, having no stores to fall back upon, may be cut to pieces or have to surrender en bloc. Mukden is their city of refuge—if they can reach it—but only for a time, for reports arrive that already they are making preparation to rush the army north to Harbin expecting the victorious Japs to capture even Mukden. The Russians will have some opinions on the "Yellow Terror."

The military critic on the Review staff submits the following account of the situation localized in S. Grey which is approximately correct. He asks us to assume as follows: let Durham represent Liaoyang and our railway be supposed to be continued north to O. Sound, which is Mukden. Rocky river (rather far away) be the Taizse river. The Russian front extends from Allan Park to Bunesan, Jap armies are striking and fighting from Neustadt, Ayton, Holstein, Drumore, when suddenly Kuropatkin in Durham hears that Kuroki has, out by Pricerville, led a Jap army over the Taizse (Saugeen) and is marching through G. enelg to reach and cut the supposed railway at Dornoch.

No time to lose; Liaoyang (Durham) must be evacuated, a rush north must be made by rail or anyway, leaving the vast stores collected here to the flames or to the Japs. The circle of Jap armies fighting for days, rush in, get a square meal at the Knapp House the Middaugh House or the Central Hotel, and capturing some 200 Russian guns rush north to Rocky Saugeen. Kuroki finds he can't head the Russians off at Dornoch, so he aims for Mukden (O. S.) trying to get ahead of the fleeing Russians, and at this writing it is uncertain who will win. Meanwhile in Durham and neighborhood about 60,000 Russians and Japs are lying dead and wounded.

We close with a fine abstract from the military critic of the Globe a few days ago:

"A great milestone in history has been set up on the field of Liaoyang. There are but few such in the records of the past century. At Waterloo one of the great conquerors of all time was finally crushed. At Solferino, almost half a century after, his nephew, Napoleon Third, made possible the re-creation of the Italian nation, fighting not because of love for the land of his ancestors, but for the haub of military glory. At Sadowa in 1866 Austria was deposed from her former position as the leader of the Teutonic peoples. At Gettysburg it was determined that the American people should remain one and indivisible. At Sedan, the France of Imperialism passed away. When the Shipka Pass was forced by Russia, Turkey shrank to the proportions of a third-rate power. Now, at Liaoyang, Asia shakes off the conqueror and stands up the equal in war of the white-skinned races. The echoes of the guns of Liaoyang will reverberate for centuries after Ouyama, Kuropatkin and the four hundred thousand men who fought under them have joined the host who lie dead to-day in the trenches of one of the world's great battlefields."

The Poultry Fattening Stations.

Seventeen illustration poultry fattening stations are being operated this year by the Dominion Department of Agriculture under the supervision of Mr. F. C. Elford, Acting Chief of the Poultry Division. Only two of these are in Ontario, at Bowmanville and Holmesville and expert operators are in charge. Another year we hope to see a station in South Grey.

A great deal of the operator's time is given to showing farmers how the work of fattening is done, therefore the salary of the operator and the cost of installing the plant are considered as experimental and educational expenditures. The selling price of the dressed chickens is, however, expected to exceed the first cost of the chickens and the cost of feeding, plucking and marketing. The work of each station is confined to fattening enough chickens for illustration purposes. About 200 is the maximum number kept at one time. The operator is not allowed to be a competing buyer with others who have begun to fatten chickens as a private enterprise. If the farmers are already getting a fair price for their poultry, the station will confine its efforts to illustration or experimental work with even less than 200 birds. Those who are carrying on the work for themselves will be considered not rivals but friends, and will be offered

assistance when possible.

Special attention is being paid to choosing the right sort of bird for fattening: for instance, the blocky type of Plymouth Rock or Wyandotte recommended as suitable for the purpose. The operators are required to spend as much of their time as may be required in assisting those who are engaged in or entering the business, by giving instruction in buying the proper type for fattening in killing and plucking, packing, shipping, etc.

Only birds of the proper type will be bought this year and seven cents per pound will be paid for these at the stations. An extra good type might well be worth eight cents, while another type of the same breed would be too dear at five cents a pound.

Each operator is considered responsible for the work and success of his station. He is expected, as far as possible, to find a suitable market for the birds fattened at the station. The Department will, however, endeavor to provide a market for any surplus stock above local requirements. Each station will be conducted as much like a private enterprise as possible, the Department assisting the operator in marketing, etc., as it would a private firm initiating a new business.

The demand for chickens fattened at the Government stations is very brisk this season, and from the offers already received it is expected that the ruling price will be from 11 to 13 cts per lb. Parties fattening chickens according to the methods recommended by the Poultry Division, who may wish assistance in marketing can obtain on application to Mr. Elford, a list of dealers who will be glad to purchase their birds.
