TOPICS OF THE WEEK

—Election trials begin in Centre Bruce and North York, Tuesday Sept. 20, and in North Renfrew and North Norfolk on September 27. Later—Hugh Clark, Conservative in Centre Bruce has been confirmed in his seat.

—The conspiracy of perjury in the North Grey election trial has failed so far as the importation of Buffalo pluggers are concerned. The trial is postponed for some weeks but at this writing it appears certain that MacKay will hold his seat.

—A comparative hush has come over the War news, both armies apparently bracing themselves by less strenuous fighting for another mighty conflict, possibly near Mukden. Japan seems still pressing on three sides. Kurapatkin is reported to be falling back on Harbin, and it would appear that it will require another "masterly retreat," to enable him to get there. At Port Arthur conditions must be awful in the beleaguered town. New and larger Japanese guns are dropping shells with deadly effectiveness, fresh troops are arriving, tunneling under the forts is in progress, for the Japs, ever ingenious and daring, will attack them from below if he cannot do it on the level or from above. Port Arthur at present could furnish illustrations for Dante's Inferno.

NO DUM-DUM BALLOTS.

The Liberal candidate in the Soo constituency, Mr. C. N. Smith, has been unseated for a piece of the most unblushingly corrupt election work by agents we have yet seen. We have no doubt we shall hear more of the "cruise of the Minnie M." which took a lot of personators and pluggers from the American side to vote at an obscure polling place. True, the irregular votes would not wipe out the majority and Mr. Smith has been cleared of personal knowledge of the disgraceful affair yet none will blame the judges for voiding the election.

There is great need for some man or measure of heroic nature, that will embody in legislation effective preventives to the slimy work prevailing at elections. We want a type of public men and a standard of political morality that will frown down every crookedness, that will accept defeat but not dishonor, and more, that will refuse to profit by dirty work of all kinds. This is demanded by every consideration of private integrity and public honor. Fight and fight keenly, but let the weapons be fair. We have no use for dum dum ballots in this warfare, and any man or machine found adopting them should meet with all the execration that the use of dum dum bullets in war receives.

THE SCOTTISH CHURCH CASE.

Since the famous judgment of the House of Lords, favoring the remnant of the Free Church who did not enter the union, it has been freely stated, that the remnant during the four years since the union had been harshly treated. The United Free Church has caused a reply to be issued to meet this charge of harshness, which seems to effectually refute it. We append the five points without the amplification found in many papers:

First—Each minister who did not enter the United Free Church of Scotland was left in undisturbed possession of his manse.

Second—The congregations of these ministers were left in undisturbed possession of their churches.

Third—Vacant congregations which did not wish to enter the union were left in undisturbed possession of their church property.

Fourth—In congregations where the ministers entered the United Free Church, but in which a minority or a majority of the members and adherents did not, the church committees, on Dec. 14th, 1900, informed the ministers of all such parishes that the church wished them to meet, as far as possible, the members and adherents who did not see their way to entering the United Free Church, by giving them facilities for holding services in churches, halls and mission-houses.

Fifth—No retired minister or agent of the Church who did not enter the union was deprived of his retiring allowance.
