THE TWO SCHEMES.

The chief points of contrast between the Grand Trunk Pacific project and the Canadian Pacific project which the Tories launched are these:

1. The Canadian Pacific is from end to end the property of the company which was chartered and subsidized to build it. The Dominion will own one-half of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and will be part proprietor of the other half through a lien held as security for guarantee of interest.

2. The Dominion Government constructed two costly sections of the Canadian Pacific—from Lake Superior to Winnipeg and from Kamloops to the Pacific Ocean—and made a present of these completed portions to the company. The Grand Trunk Pacific from Winnipeg to near the Atlantic Ocean will be built by the Government, but will remain the property of the people of Canada in perpetuity, the company after seven years paying a rental of 3 per cent per annum, the rate likely to be paid by the Government for the money borrowed to pay for construction.

3. Parliament granted to the Canadian Pacific a cash subsidy of \$25,000,000. The only financial aid given to the Grand Trunk Pacific, other than that just mentioned, is a guarantee of interest—which will not cost the country anything save for the first seven years on the Mountain section—to the capitalists who furnish the means of construction west of Winnipeg.

4. Parliament gave the Canadian Pacific 25,000,000 acres of land, including the privilege of establishing town sites. Not an acre of land, except for right of way and station facilities, is given to the Grand Trunk Pacific. To enhance this discrimination, the Canadian Pacific lands were made free of taxation for twenty years unless "sold or occupied." This has so far been held to mean twenty years from the actual specific conveyance of the lands to the corporation, not from the date of the agreement—a difference which means many additional millions of dollars to the Canadian Pacific.

5. As far as it was possible to do so the Dominion Parliament gave the Canadian Pacific Company a monopoly of the traffic of the Dominion west of Lake Superior, by prohibiting the building of other lines, except such as would of necessity become feeders of the Canadian Pacific. The Grand Trunk Pacific Company must take its chances in competition with existing trunk lines and with any others that may hereafter be chartered and constructed.

6. Parliament granted to the Canadian Pacific virtually absolute control of transportation charges west of Lake Superior. The absolute control of such charges on the Grand Trunk Pacific is vested in the Dominion. The difference is made clearly apparent by the fact that, so far as its main line is concerned, the Canadian Pacific cannot be brought under the control of the Railway Commission recently created by the Parliament, whereas the Grand Trunk Pacific is placed under that control by the terms of its charter.

[We shall give next week a further instalment of distinctions between the initial and permanent differences in the two great railway bargains, which will show still more conclusively, if that is necessary, how good is the bargain secured by our government.—Ed.]

THE PREMIER'S DISLOYALTY.

One of the favorite Tory cries is that, being a French Canadian, Sir Wilfrid Laurier takes no sort of interest in the Canadian militia, but would starve it to death if he could. The figures in the case do not warrant this cowardly imputation on the Premier.

From 1868 to 1896 the total expenditure of all kinds on the militia was \$43,750,000. This included the cost of repelling the second Fenian attack and suppressing the half-breed insurrection in the North-West.

From 1897 to 1904 the expenditure was \$23,865,000. There were no extra outlays during this period.

To compare the last seven years of Tory rule, 1896 to 1896, with the seven years of Liberal rule from 1897 to 1904, the figures are:—

Tory seven years.....\$12,352,000
 Liberal seven years.....23,865,000

Liberal excess.....\$11,513,000

This may be cited as evidence of Liberal extravagance, if you like, but it completely disproves the charge that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has purposefully neglected the militia.

Important Bulletin on Weed Seeds.

The Seed Division of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has just issued an illustrated bulletin on the "Weed Seeds commonly found in Timothy, Alsike and Red Clover Seeds." It is well known that large quantities of seeds of many noxious weeds are each year unwittingly sown with grass and clover seeds. The resemblance of many weed seeds to the commercial seeds with which they are found makes their detection difficult to an untrained eye, even if they be present to the extent of several hundred per pound. It is therefore of great importance to be able to identify at least the seeds of those weeds which are seriously injurious in agriculture. The text and illustration of this bulletin (No 16, New Series) are published with a view to assist farmers to identify the more dangerous weed seeds common to grass and clover seeds. The illustrations of seeds are from drawings by J. H. Faull, lecturer in Botany, University of Toronto, and the descriptions are by
