REAL PAINLESS DENTISTRY.

Swiss Professors Discover a New Anaes-

Washington, Sept. 26.-After three years of patient research, two professors

of Geneva, Switzerland, have discovered a new anaesthetic, which promises to revolutionize the practice of dentistry. In reporting this to the State Depart ment, United States Consul Liefeld, at Freiburg, Germany, states that, finding the nervous system was influenced by colored light, the professors soon perceived, after experimenting with each hue, that blue had an extraordinarily soothing effect on the nerves.

The Consul says that a tooth may be painlessly extracted with none of the usual after effects by shutting up the patient in a dark room and exposing his eyes to a blue light of sixteen candle power for three minutes, causing him to lose all sense of pain, although at the same time retaining his senses.
