MULE BREEDING.

Livestock experts are predicting that the big money of the uext few years to be made in stock will be gathered in by the breeders of mules. When construction work on the Panama Canal begins in earnest, they say the price of mules is bound to jump, because these are the only animals that can stand the intense heat of that section and keep on working. The West Indies, Africa and the Philip pine Islands have also been drawing heavily upon this country for mules, and the American mule is increasing in favor as a part of the equipment of European

As a matter of fact mules have been steadily rising in value. In Texas, Kentucky, Tennessee and Missouri there are big mule farms which have enriched their owners in the last ten years. Yet, for some reason or another, the former mule breeding sections are not producing mules fast enough to supply the demand and their production is declining. Not many years ago Kentucky had 35,000 jennets, while now there are not more than 2,500. The same decline is noted in Texas, Mis-

souri and Tennessee. The mule has been the standard work animal of the Southern States for many years. It is there, of course, that he flourishes most. Texas tops the list with 407,000, with Missouri next with 209,000. Of all the Southern States Virginia boasts of the smallest number, 42,000.
