Prohibition not an Issue.

We have been credibly informed that the Conservative candidate has been requesting support for himself because Mr. Miller, the reform candidate, is, as he says a "temperance man." Prohibition can only be introduced into the present campaign for partisan political purposes and has nothing to do with the issue, for the Dominion Government has nothing at all to do with Prohibition or with the license or liquor question which is regulated and controlled solely by the Ontario Legislature. Leaders Laurier and Borden have each publicly stated that they are not prohibitionists and it is not possible that either party in the House of Commons can or will enact any law to prohibit the liquor traffic. The prohibition therefore can only be introduced as a political trick. Mr. Miller does not drink and never did and we are certain that he will not be hypocrite enough to do so now to catch any man's vote but is that any reason why any one should refuse to vote for him? How much liquor would he have to drink, say every twenty-four hours, to make him a more suitable candidate than he is not to drink at all? It will be worse if he were concerned to conduct the campaign on higher grounds.

An active Conservative worker in Normandy is canvassing against Mr. Miller because he is "A Methodist and a Temperance Man." We believe that until some more serious crime can be urged against Mr. Miller, the electors of South Grey will continue to think him a very excellent candidate and one worthy of their votes. Any elector, no matter how much or how little he may drink himself, will prefer a sober member of parliament just as he prefers to employ a sober man to attend to any other important business. An intemperate member can be no credit to any constituency.
