We learn that Conservative Meetings are to be held this week in Normanby Dromore and Holstein from the 19th to 21st. We are glad of this: Mr Miller's proposal of Union Meetings has not so far been agreed to, Mr Miller's offer to give reasonable time to the opposition candidate or his friends at his own meetings has not been accepted, but now that the Conservative Candidate has decided to hold meetings, the campaign will take on new features, and the people will be able to judge of the fitness of the two men for the position they are aspiring to.

HOUSE OF REFUGE.—The Grand Jury at the Court of General Sessions in O. Sound last week made their usual "presentment." They found 14 prisoners in jail, the General and Marine Hospital flourishing, a small number of indictments, and dealt at length with the new House of Refuge, recommending that the County make provision to pay expenses of jury visiting it twice a year. The building receives high commendation, but the barn is condemned in design and construction. The purchase of fire hose is recommended, also that the council be generous with the contractor who found his estimates had landed him with financial loss, but had done his part in a thorough and efficient manner. The report concludes: "Although the house has been open only a few months, there are now 23 inmates viz; 10 males and 4 females, all apparently happy, contented and well pleased with their surroundings and care. We do not think however that the matron can continue to discharge the heavy duties developing upon her. In our opinion the county council should supply further help for the house work. The county is to be congratulated upon having now a comfortable well equipped and up-to-date home for those aged citizens who through poverty, infirmity or misfortune have no home of their own."

LAST WEEK'S MEETINGS.—Mr Miller had good meetings last week except in Holstein, where pouring rain came on in the evening. He was greatly encouraged at the support he received. We had the pleasure of hearing him at Hampden and his masterly handling of National issues marks him out as eminently the man for S. Grey. No opposition has been offered at any of his meetings, and his desire for union meetings has not been acquiesced in. We presume Nomination Day will be the only time both will be found on one platform.

A CLEVER CAPTURE followed by as clever an escape occurred last Wednesday on arrival of the train. Local constables were warned to look out for a man of certain stamp guilty of some misdemeanor at Guelph. The man turned up, was arrested by Constable Whelan and taken to the Middagham House, where he was left in charge of someone till a magistrate could be secured. Innocently asking to be allowed to go to the closet, permission was granted, he went up stairs, and that was the last seen of him, having escaped by a back stairway to freedom and in time to elude all pursuers.

FRUIT EXHIBITION.—The First Provincial Fruit, Flower and Honey Exhibition will be held at Toronto, Ontario, November, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 1904, at Granite Rinks, Church Street. The 33rd Annual Convention of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association meets at same time. It is hoped that two purposes will be accomplished by the holding of this exhibition. First:—Fruit and flower growers and apiarists will receive valuable information regarding the most modern methods of carrying on their respective lines of work. This should result in a general improvement in the quality of their products. Second:—The number and high quality of the exhibits and the large extent of country which they will represent, will demonstrate the magnitude and importance of the fruit, flower and honey interests of Ontario. In connection with the fruit exhibits, there will be many interesting features. Great prominence will be given to the proper picking, grading and packing of fruit. The Dominion fruit division will make a special exhibit of fruit packed for export. Demonstrations will be given by experts of the best methods of packing fruit.

## A QUEER CAMPAIGN.

At date of writing, (Tuesday, Oct. 18), no public meeting for the Conservative candidate have been held, none announced that we have seen, and none of Mr Miller's have been taken advantage of to discuss the public issues of the day. That the Conservative candidate and his friends have not been idle we don't doubt, but in this silence, this departure from old time practice satisfactory to the party that has had such fighters in its day as Geo. Jackson and John Blyth, Dr. Jamieson and Matthew Richardson? Is the candidate ashamed of the party he not many years ago strongly opposed but whose livery he now wears? or is the party ashamed of the candidate? Is it satisfactory to the man who seeks to represent us in public places in the national councils, should shun apparently, public discussion of national questions? The answer from most parties will be, we believe, that it is not satisfactory, and that however good a man Mr McKinnon is as a neighbor, a citizen or a County councillor, he is not the man to represent the intelligent electorate of South Grey.

The absence of public pronouncement leaves open the temptation to be all things to all men; we are not sure that Mr McKinnon has avoided this temptation, but we ever took part in his campaign we ever took part in his developed so much of palfry politics as has this. Reformers have been appealed to, and by the candidate, for their votes because Laurier is safe anyway and his government sure to be retained, one Conservative in S Grey not affecting the big result! Reformers are assured with falseness that good Laurier measures will be supported, appeals are made to nationality, &c, but we don't believe this sapping and mining will overthrow the citadel of principle that has its foundations in the belief that the Laurier government should be supported by Laurier candidates, who are not afraid to proclaim from the house tops the virtues of his administration.

Two weeks ago we referred to sectional canvassing practices. The "credible information" we spoke of is confirmed this week by candidate Miller's letter; but last week's Chronicle contained evidence enough to justify our heading that this is a "queer campaign."

We were taken to task for introducing personalities—nothing of the sort—we were deprecating personalities, and when we asserted candidate Miller's temperance principles there was no way to justify them except by contrasting with an opposite course not necessarily impugning that course to his opponent, which was not our aim.

But what is the aim of the unhappy individual who writes "Corner Concerns"? What capacity for meanness lies in the nature that asserts libellously, that dealing with H. H. Miller will land a man in the Poor House? A man whose shoes he is not worthy to blacken. About whom he writes glaring falsehoods as is shown by letters this week. This precious information, collected or invented by someone in his party has been given to him to handle, a sure indication that they recognize his fitness to do the dirty work.

Five weeks ago we were told Miller was an American. Was this one of the lies amended later to appear that his father was? But why go on, this is the character of the queer campaign on the Conservative side, so markedly at variance with former practices, when national issues would be discussed.
