**SIR WILFRID'S TOUR.**

Sir Wilfrid's health may not be rugged but opponents who build on its decay must have been dashed lately to see the vigor he displays. Hamilton, Toronto, Guelph, Chatham, London on the way from London to Locknow he made four speeches at four stations, and always with effectiveness though necessarily brief. Here is a pathetic peroration made at Lucknow with characteristic eloquence, referring to the fairness of his government he said: "When the day comes that I shall be laid in my grave, be that near or far, everyone will have to admit that the life which will have been closed was a life devoted to the best interests of Canada. Everybody will have to admit who thinks without passion or prejudice that I fought an honest battle in everything and that I never appealed to the feelings or prejudices of my own countrymen, or to any creed, but that I fought simply on the principles of the great party of reform. I am of French blood, but I do not remember that there ever was a day in my life when I did not proclaim myself a liberal of the English school, a liberal of the school of Fox and of Bright. I do not know what made me so. Yes, I know, God made me so. He gave me these views, and I endeavor to carry them out. I have been eight years in office and I am proud to say after these eight years of office the man does not live that can stand before me and say that I have ever stirred up any prejudice. On the contrary, the language that I use here I use in my own Province, and I ask them, as I ask you, to forget those days which should be forgotten, that are past, and stand up for Canada, Canada first and Canada always." (Applause.)

**THE WAR.**

Fearful and awful is the carnage taking place in Manchuria. A battle 10 days' long is in progress and many thousands of men have "hit the dust. Two weeks ago Kurapatkin issued a bombastic bulletin to his army that the time had come to advance to relieve Port Arthur. St Petersburg said: "Yes, Yes, now you'll see something" and was in ecstasy of delight. The advance began, Japan was pressed back a bit, but the wonderful warriors again rolled on the Russians, have driven them back, captured over 60 guns, and though the Russians have won at some points, it is almost certain that Kurapatkin will achieve nothing but a "masterly retreat." The Japs are resolving to defy nature and carry on a winter war, when cold will be added to the horrors of the battlefield. Port Arthur is longing for help that never comes and it is expected to fall now early in November. The Baltic fleet starts and stops at intervals.
