A QUESTION OF FIGURES.  
Mr Richardson Counted Out.

At the Conservative meeting at Drummond on Thursday evening last Mr. M. K. Richardson, Esq. M. P., in trying to show that the Grand Trunk Pacific would cost much more than is estimated by the Ottawa Government, ridiculed the idea that it could effect a loan at 3 per cent and asserted that Canada had never been able to get a loan at so low a rate. Mr. Arthur W. Wright of Mt. Forest, who followed in the interest of Mr. Miller, contradicted this assertion, and stated that the government had effected a loan at 2 1/2 per cent. Dr. Richardson asked him for his authority. He could give only his memory, but promised to look the matter up and either confirm or withdraw the statement. Mr Wright also spoke at Holstein on Friday evening and was able then to say that in 1897 Mr. Fielding on the London market had effected a 2 1/2 per cent loan at the rate of £91, 10s. 5d on £100, which would be at a rate of less than 2 1/2 per cent on the money received. Mr Richardson in his address which followed, disputed this statement, saying that the difference between £100 and £91, 10s. 5d, which must be paid at the maturity of the bonds had not been taken into account, and that if it were the real rate paid would be considerably over 3 per cent. He would refer the matter to any mathematical expert. Mr Wright had no opportunity to reply but he writes us to say that if those interested will look up the Hansard of 1898, Vol. I., page 3120, they will find that the real rate paid for the money borrowed, taking into consideration that it was sold below par, is just about 2 1/2 per cent. This is still 1/2 per cent below 3 per cent as low as which Mr. Richardson stated Canada had never been able to borrow money.

### Ballot-Box Sensation

A mild sensation was made this week when it became known that a prominent T. P. official had stated publicly at one of Mr. McKinnon's meetings in the T. P. Hall, Glenelg, that four years ago, he as Deputy Returning Officer had received a ballot box, with government stamp, and containing a secret chamber for the manipulation of bogus ballots! and that as he had refused to do dirty work he had not, as usual, been appointed D. R. O. Investigation showed that the same boxes had been in use in Glenelg since voting by ballot began, that there was not and never was such a device. The top of the box is made of two pieces of tin fastened together for strength and solder or wire being used for strength in one the under piece may have opened a little, causing the so-called secret chamber! The hole of course, goes through both pieces and it would be impossible to use fraud in this way, for the scrutineers and the poll book at close of poll would at once detect a discrepancy.

### Cows that pay and Cows that don't.

Mr J. C. Chapais, Assistant Dairy Commissioner, who is particularly well acquainted with agricultural conditions in Quebec, said in an address: From my experience, I am led to believe that the reason why the Babcock test is not more generally adopted as a basis for payment for milk is lack of knowledge on the part of the farmers. They do not know anything about the true value of cows. When they are told that a cow that yields thirty pounds of milk is more valuable than one yielding forty pounds they do not understand it. I came across an instance of this kind when I was working with the inspectors in the Lake of St. John district. One man said, "I have the best cow in the parish, she gives sixty pounds of milk." I went out to his place, having with me the figures as to the butter fat in his milk. I got from him the facts as to cost of feeding his cow, and figured out the cost of the milk. I found that it cost, allowing the ordinary price for the feed used, about 96 cents per hundred pounds. At the priest's house I got the figures about a cow owned by him whose milk cost only 44 cents per hundred pounds. I showed the man that the percentage of butter fat in the milk of his cow was 2.85, while in that of the priest's cow it was 5.50. I was able to show him that, instead of having the best cow in the parish, he had the worst. The result was that, whereas this man generally sold a calf at \$15 at birth, the next year, although the calf was a better, nobody would buy it. This shows that the farmers will understand this matter if we go to them and explain it.

### HUNTING EXTENSION.

Owing to the fact that the Dominion Elections will be held on the 3rd of November, and that a great many hunters have represented that unless the season is extended they will be unable to exercise their franchise, an Order-in-Council has been passed extending the hunting season north and west of French River, Lake Nipissing and the Mattawa River (to) 19th day of November.

A similar extension would be granted throughout the rest of Ontario if the Statute so provided. While the Statute cannot be changed, it has been decided that a few days grace be allowed, viz— to and including November 19th.
