

On the completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific those commodities can be carried from the Feace River Country and else where in the North-West to the Pacific coast at rates which will permit of their profitable shipment to China and Japan in competition with like products from the Pacific States. Without doubt the Government would have been charged with culpable neglect of our agricultural interests if it had not taken a hand in the great Japanese fair.
