On Wednesday of last week a very pleasant evening was spent in the basement of the Presbyterian church here when a goodly number gathered to extend a hearty welcome to Mrs. Aitchison. The night was an ideal one and the modish basement was soon filled to overflowing. Mr. Petherbrough of the Rocky congregation was unanimously chosen chairman and discharged the duties of that office in a creditable and satisfactory manner. The ladies of the congregation are to be congratulated on the lunch provided, all doing ample justice to the many tempting delicacies. The choir rendered several fine selections and were heartily encored.

THANKSGIVING

To-day, Thursday, the nation is invited to acknowledge the blessings of a Divine providence by a cessation from usual employments and the nation sets the example to the individual by giving a holiday in all departments under its control. The churches too, fall in with the day fixed by the state and in a general way by holding services, afford an opportunity to all citizens to rationally observe the day of Thanksgiving.

SCHOOL PROBLEM.

The report of Principal Allan for October made in the regular form to the School Board contains some facts for the trustees and the town to digest, and we think both cannot begin the process too soon.

By way of introducing the matter we presume it is well known there is a High School as well as a Public School department in our Educational emporium. The High School department handling what is called "Continuation work," the continuation classes being exactly those that are intended for High School pupils. We have also, as is well known a Model School for the training of primary teachers, the Model School term occupying the fall months.

The increase of the school population of this town necessitated the addition of an 8th teacher at the beginning of this year thus occupying every part of our School building. When the Model term came on a crush again took place and one of the Junior rooms (Miss M. McCallin's) had to be accommodated in the Public Library building during the Model term, one room being required for the Modelites.

Now a new situation presents its claims. The increase of the attendance in the High School Department has been so great that an extra teacher is at once required and to accommodate this the temporary arrangement in the Public Library must be continued with the perplexing certainty that in the fall of 1905, a second extra room will have to be found somewhere.

Mr. Allan during October volunteered to help the situation by taking classes while the model students were teaching and he states his experience to the Board in this plain language:

"After having had nearly a month's experience in teaching an hour and a half a day in the High School Department, I am forced to come to the conclusion that a third teacher in this department is absolutely necessary if the work is to be done efficiently, if we are to retain in our school those who come from a distance and if the reputation of our school is to be kept up.

According to the New Regulations, p. 46, section 40, sub. sec. 1, the average class attendance in the Lower School is not to be more than twenty-five. Now we have thirty-eight in one room and thirty-nine in the other. In the latter room we are compelled to make two classes in Algebra, Euclid, Latin and French, and yet the two lessons have to be taught in half an hour. Again in teaching Physics I find it absolutely impossible to arrange a class of nearly forty around the table so that each pupil can even get a chance of seeing the experiment performed.

If a third teacher were engaged for the first half of 1905, we would be able to so arrange the work that all the subjects required to be taught by the New Regulations could be taken up, but if two teachers have to do the work some of the subjects will not receive the attention required by law.

Considering it my duty to let you know the true state of affairs and believing that your aim is to keep up the standing of our school, I trust you will immediately give the matter your most serious consideration."
