If these brace ets of eggs be removed whenever seen, much serious injury will be averted the following spring. The canker-worms pass the win. ter in the egg state, and these eggs are The codling-worm passes the winter in a cocoon, under bits of bark, boards, and in crevices, and a general clearing will get rid of many of these troublesome pests. The grapevine flea beetle and the plum curculio pass the winter in their full grown beetle condition in sheltered spots, often near the base of the plant. Squash bugs also winter over full-grown

in sheltered spots, under boards and in corners of outbuildings. There is also a necessity for a thorough c'eming up of the orchard for the purpose of destroying many of the fungi which remains on the ground in disea ed leaves and fruit.
