Why the Eyes Fire.

One makes a great mistake by saying that the eyes are tired and that the retina or seeing portion of the eye is fatigued. This is not the case, for the retina hardly ever gets tired. The fatigue is in the inner and other muscles attached to the eyeball and the muscles of accommodation which surround the lens of the eye. When a near object has to be looked at this muscle relaxes and allows the lens to thicken, increasing its refractive power. The inner and outer muscles are used in covering the eye on the object to be looked at, the inner one being especially used when a near object is looked at. It is in the three muscles mentioned that the fatigue is felt, and relief i secured temporarily by closing the eyes or gazing at far distant objects. The usual indication of strain is a redness of the rim of the eye, betokening a congested state of the inner surface, accompanied by some pain.
