FROM SLAVERY TO WEALTH.

How an African Black Became Rich and A British cruiser swooped down on a slaver off the West Coast of Africa, the human cargo was set ashore, and among the "pickaninnies" saved was a little boy whom the missionaries christened Richard Blaize. This bappened many years ago, and yesterday Mr. R. B. Blaize died at Lagos, a millionaire, a

great philanthopist and an honored citizen of the Empire. It was to Sierra Leone that the leased child slave was taken, and missionary society adopting him, he was educated in the Christian faith, and later entered the printing department at Lagos, in which he rose to be head

Coaling at Sea.

Large quantities of coal have been carried to sea to replenish the bunkers of the Russian war fleet on its way to the Orient. The comparatively new expedients for coaling steamships at sea will have the most thorough tests yet given to them. The results of experiments with the transference of coal in seas not too rough seem to have placed the work on a practical basis.
