ERROR DUE TO SUN SPOTS.

Matter Affects Compass.

London, Dec. 5.-In a lecture before Maunder, superintendent of the solar department of the Greenwich Observatory, announced as the result of prolonged investigations his belief that the familiar magnetic disturbances which derange the mariner's compass are directly related to sun spots. He thinks \$185. the mysterious force which agitates the earth is a stream of attenuated matter, like a comet's tail or electrically charged particles, shot out from the sun spots. The rotary motion of the sun causes this stream to assume the form sented by 129 entries, aggregating \$2,415.

A happy feature was the number of the reception rooms for the comfort of the guests, a feature which was wanting in most of the buildings erected by other nations and states. Mr. Cottrell, with his assistants, was untiring in his effeorts to promote the interests of the exhibitors.
