TOWN COUNCIL.

There is a calmness abroad about town council affairs which may or may not precede a storm. No opposition is talked of for Mayor Hunter, who will likely have the compliment of a second term placed in his hands. As for the council time will tell.

A step is being taken we understand to issue debentures to consolidate the floating debt of the town, which it seems, has a habit of growing in altogether too healthy a manner. A by-law is to be presented on Jan. 1, to authorize this, and thus there will be the cost of recent permanent improvements.

There is a danger in this micawhere-like method of staving off the evil day, and for this danger it is we refer to it all. The by-law will have to be carried, but it is surely time that every council should see to it that unless for very extraordinary expenditure, every year should stand on its own merits.

A low tax-rate is very desirable, but it is no use hiding our heads, ostrich fashion, to discover some day, on uncovering, that our debt is growing.

There may therefore be good practice in voting on Jan. 1. For County Council, town Council, possibly trustees, and now this by-law.

County Council Election.

Monday next, 19th inst., W. B. Volkert, Nominating Officer, County Division No. 3, wants us all before him to choose two men to represent us at the County Score for the next two years. If we can't agree upon two men, he sends us off to vote on the nominees on the 1st day of January 1905.

If the two present members would stand there would likely be an acclamation, but it is said Mr. McKinnon is going to resign and therefore a contest is sure. Of new names spoken of there is no lack. Amongst the number are: Leslie and M. Jacklyn, of Bentinck, N. McCannel and Jas. Staples, of Glenelg, and Wm. Sharp, of Durham. These may present themselves for the vacant places, for it seems certain Duncan McLean will go in.

There should be a good attendance at this meeting to hear county questions discussed.

PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS.

Voting, Jan. 25, '05.

The Globe of Tuesday contained the announcement which has been expected for some time, of the date of the elections. Nominations will be held on Jan. 18, voting one week later.

The race then is now fairly on, most of the Candidates are in the field and have about 6 weeks to present their claims. The date chosen is as good as a winter one could be, and will not seriously interfere with the holiday trade or holiday pleasures.

The result, as usual is to be a victory for both sides, judging by party papers. Time will tell. We may be biased, but comparing the enthusiasm displayed at the Great Convention of Liberals with the comparative indifference to the Conference of their opponents, we believe the Province is once more going to pronounce for the ablest and most honest leader in the parties to-day, the Hon. G. W. Ross.

Nor will this be surprising except to those who have been taught to look upon the Hon. G. W. Ross as the embodiment of all evil, as in daily conference with "Cap" Sullivan, as lying awake nights scheming to steal elections instead of knowing as they should, that he is the embodiment of honor, has lived a life above reproach, and has no peer in Provincial politics to-day.

Had his administration been assailed for any failure in the various departments of the government, there would be room for honest doubt, but to be attacked solely with the weapons and the warfare of slander is to arouse in the breast of all fair-minded men just such a spirit as had its embodiment in the great Massey Hall Convention, and will later show itself in victory at the polls.

SOUTH GREY CAMPAIGN.

Mr. Jno. McKechnie, Liberal Candidate, has, since the nomination, covered a lot of ground, and has shown a vigor in organization work, which has tokens success on Jan. 25 next. Next week at latest the preliminary arrangements will have been made, and the contest fairly entered upon.

The issue in S. Grey should not for a moment be in doubt. The Liberal party never were in better heart for a struggle: they have a popular candidate, the unanimous choice of their Convention, a man who has spent almost his entire life in South Grey, since coming from Scotland, whose business instinct is very marked, and who will look after our affairs with the same assiduity he has given to his own and to that of the well known firm of which he is the Junior partner.

Nor looking at the matter provincially should the issue be in doubt here. Voters of South Grey are intelligent men, and comparing their province with others which started even in the race of Confederation they find that Ontario stands pre eminent amongst them all in wealth and influence, the only one without a debt, the only one with a surplus. This state of affairs has been achieved under the government Mr. McKechnie will support. True, they have been long in power, have spent about \$123,000,000, have built Asylums, Parliament Buildings and other Public Works, have aided roads and railways, have returned money to municipalities, as this riding well know, and all this without one breath of scandal, or charge of malfeasance of a cent, and only a fraction of less than 1 per cent was ever challenged by the opposition.

This government, lately remodelled is as virile as ever. Its capacity for constructive legislation is admittedly ahead of anything in the ranks of its opponents, where elements of disunion and distrust manifest themselves even now. John McKechnie is the candidate in South Grey supporting this government, and he asks and will get such a support as will place South Grey in the Liberal column.
