GLENORA HISTORY.

By Our Priceless Correspondent

Continued from several weeks ago.

Mr. Ed.—As the election is over and a little spare time between now and the next, we presume that we can find a column in the Review to finish up the article which we undertook some 10 months ago of giving a sketch of Glenora's Municipal officers during fifty four years. It is a hard matter to give a complete history in detail, but we shall endeavour to give in as short a space as possible a synopsis of the proceedings, &c.

Council for 1867—Chas Moffat reeve, John A McMillan deputy reeve, C Williams, George Lamb and N Dunsmoor councillors. The reeve appointed Adam Turner auditor.

Moved by Mr Lamb, seconded by Mr Dunsmoor, that James Skene (now Rev Jas Skene) be auditor.—Lost.

Moved in amendment by J A McMillan seconded by Mr Williams, that John Nichol be auditor.—Carried.

Alex Bell was appointed assessor at a salary of \$75 for all work to be done.

Francis Walker, Esq., waited on the council on behalf of Hugh Baird for assistance in rebuilding his saw mill lately destroyed by fire. The council regretted their inability to give any assistance towards the rebuilding of said mill.

On motion it was resolved that from date forward no person doing statute labor will be allowed payment for any tools broken or injured doing statute labor, such as waggons, ploughs, &c.—Carried.

[P.S.—We hope the above motion has been rescinded.]

Council for 1888—Chas Moffat reeve, John A McMillan deputy reeve, Thomas Sullivan, Shepherd Boyce and Christopher Williams councillors. The reeve appointed Adam Turner his auditor and the council John Nichol. Salary \$8 each. Alex Bell a-assessor, salary \$70.

Moved in amendment by Shepherd Boyce and seconded by Thos Sullivan that Clark Reynolds be assessor.—Lost.

Council for 1889—Chas Moffat reeve, J A McMillan deputy reeve, A C Beaton, Patrick Neil and C Williams councillors.

Moved by John A McMillan, seconded by C Williams, that the time to return the assessment roll be extended to July 1st and not to commence to 15th April.—Carried.

We notice on record petitions praying to have certain men, who are now worth thousands of dollars, exempted from taxes and the prayers were granted.

Alex Bell assessor. Petition from Jno Nichol against Union School No 12, Glenora and Artemesia. Notice of appeal on account of Glenora's portion being rated too high.

Moved by John McMillan, seconded by A C Beaton, that this council be persuaded that that part of S S No 12, G & A situated in Glenora, is suffering an injustice from the assessor's decision, lately arrived at, do authorize the reeve to ask advice relative to what means can be adopted to give a more equitable arrangement as to the proportion to be paid by the respective parties of the section and to take such action as he may be advised and report to this council at next meeting.—Carried.

Council for 1890—Chas Moffat reeve, James Staples deputy reeve, Thos Davis, A C Beaton and Patrick Neil councillors. The reeve nominated Thos Dunan as his auditor and the council Geo Dinne, Alex Leil assessor.

The petition of Chas McArthur and others in behalf of the Baptist body to allow them the use of the hall for divine services each Sabbath during the year at a rental of \$12 be granted the congregation to find light and wood.—Carried.

Council for 1891—George Binnie reeve, James Staples deputy reeve, Thomas McFadden, Thos Sullivan and A C Beaton councillors. The reeve nominated Joly A McMillan his auditor and the council George Lamb, Alex Bell assessor. Township printing awarded to Chas McArthur of the "Grey Review," being the lowest tender.

Special meeting of council held on Oct 31st at the call of the reeve in consequence to having been served with a writ in the High Court of Justice, Queen's Bench Division, at the instance of Samuel Scott, a ratepayer, the complaint of Mr Scott being that the road deviation, commonly known as the Glen road, is not the regular width, 66 feet wide, and claiming damages. All the members of council being present, it was moved by Mr Staples, seconded by Mr Beaton, that the reeve be instructed by the township solicitor to defend the case of Scott vs the Corporation of the Township of Glenora with power to draw on the treasurer to the amount of \$25.—Carried.

Council for 1892—George Binnie reeve, James Staples deputy reeve, Thomas McFadden, M K Beaton and Thos Sullivan councillors. The reeve nominated Donald McInnes as his auditor and the council appointed John McDonald the other auditor.

Moved by Mr Sullivan, seconded by Mr Beaton, that John McDonald be assessor for 1892, salary \$55.—Lost.

Moved by Mr McFadden, seconded by Mr Staples, that Alex Bell be assessor for 1892, salary \$55.—Carried.

Oscar Knoid was paid \$2.50 for burying a dead horse on Durham Road.

Council for 1893—George Binnie reeve, James Staples deputy reeve, Thomas McFadden, M K Beaton and Wm Ritchie councillors. Auditors, George Lamb and John McDonald, assessor, Alex Bell, Collectors same as previous year.

S L M Luke was paid \$10 for attendance on the late Joseph Hewit.

Council for 1894—George Binnie reeve, James Staples deputy reeve, George E Arrowsmith, Thos McFadden and Thos Sullivan councillors. R T Edwards and J McDonald auditors, Alex Bell assessor.

Printing awarded to the Standard, Markdale. Thos McFadden was granted \$6 to procure clothing for Robt Black.

Council for 1895—George Binnie reeve, James Staples deputy reeve, Geo Lamb, Geo E Arrowsmith and Thos McFadden

councillors. R T Edwards and John McDonald auditors, Alex Bell assessor.

Printing awarded Chas Ramsage of the Grey Review.

Council for 1896—George Binnie reeve, Thos McFadden deputy reeve, Thos McFadden, Geo E Arrowsmith and George Lamb councillors. Auditors, Jno McDonald and R T Edwards, A Bell assessor, collectors same as previous year.

Before the council adjourned the following motion was ably moved by Geo Lamb and seconded by Mr McFadden that the thanks of this council are due and are hereby tendered to the reeve (Mr Binnie) for the able and impartial manner in which he has presided over the council for the past year, conducting and managing the affairs of the township in a very satisfactory manner, and we regret very much that he has decided, after serving the township so faithfully as reeve for the past six years, to relinquish local municipal business, in aspiring to a higher position (that of county commissioner) to all join as one in wishing him success at the coming campaign; also not forgetting to thank the clerk and treasurer for filling their duties so faithfully.—Carried unanimously.

Council for 1897—James Staples reeve, Thos McFadden deputy reeve, John A McMillan, John Williams and Geo Lamb councillors. Ed Hunt and R T Edwards were appointed auditors. A Bell assessor.

Council for 1898—James Staples reeve, Thos McFadden deputy reeve, John Williams, John A McMillan and Jno Firth councillors, Wm Ritchie assessor. Auditors, R T Edwards and some one else (no name given). Charles Ramsage awarded township printing for 1898.

We have now finished book No 5, and our thanks are due to J S Black, Esq., township clerk, for furnishing us with all clerk's books since 1855. We do not know whether we can produce or continue the history from 1898 to date or not as the clerk cannot part with the book now in use by him. However, we will promise to finish up as well as possible.

Free Samples Of Grain Seed.

To the Editor of the REVIEW, Dear Sir,

By instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture another distribution will be made this season of samples of the most productive sorts of grain to Canadian farmers for the improvement of seed. The stock for distribution is of the very best and has been secured mainly from the excellent crops recently had at the branch Experimental Farm at Indian Head in the North-west Territories. The distribution this spring will consist of samples of oats, spring wheat, barley, Indian corn and potatoes. The quantity of oats to be sent this year will be 4 lbs., and of wheat or barley 5 lbs., sufficient in each case to sow one twentieth of an acre. The samples of Indian corn and potatoes will weigh 3 lbs., as heretofore. A quantity of each of the following varieties has been secured for this distribution:—

OATS.—Banner, Wide-Awake, Improved Liggett, Waverley, Goldfinger, Abundance and Thousand Dollar.

WHEAT.—Preston, Red Pife, Percy, Stanley, Huron, Laurel and White Hife.

BARLEY.—Star-voiced, —Mensury, O-gessa, Mansfield, Claude and Royal, Theo-voiced, —Sidney, Invincible, Standwell and Canadian Thorpe.

POTATOES.—Carman No. 1, Early White Prize, Canadian Beauty, Uncle Sam, American Wonder, Bovee, Early Andes and Late Puritan.

Every farmer may apply, but only one sample can be sent to each applicant hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley or potatoes, and applications for more than one sample for one household cannot be entertained. These samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent in any time before the 1st of March, after which the lists will be closed, so that all the samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Parties writing should mention the sort of variety they would prefer, with a second sort as an alternative, and should the available stock of both varieties be exhausted, some other good sort will be sent instead. Those applying for Indian corn or potatoes will please bear in mind that the corn is not available for distribution until March or April, and that potatoes cannot be mailed from here until danger from frost in transit is over.
