THE DEATH ROLL.

MAGGIE WALLACE.

Last Thursday the town was deeply moved to learn that Miss Maggie Wallace daughter of Mr Thos. Wallace, Normanby, had died at Mr Geo. Hepburn's town. She had been in attendance at the High School Classes here, and just one week before she died she was at school in her usual health. She contracted a cold which developed into pneumonia, and despite all care, the spirit took its flight. She was in her 17th year, was proving a brilliant student, so her teachers say, and on the testimony of all who knew her was a most amiable girl. How great is the "heart-rug" of parents and brothers and sisters, over the loss of one just budding into womanhood, only those similarly bereaved can tell. She was loving and beloved, and the memory of her home-light and pure companionship, will always be cherished and never be let go. She was a member of Knox Normal High School, Rev Mr Farquharson, on Thursday conducted a brief service at the house of Mr Hepburn, before the remains were taken to the parental home. Our sincere sympathy is extended to our old neighbors.

MR. JAS. McCracken.

Monday of this week, Death came a second time into the home of Mrs McCracken, 3rd Con., Glenelg, and ten days after husband and father had been called away the youngest son was taken. This double stroke in so brief a time is a peculiarly severe affliction, and the doubly-bereaved mother and brother and sisters have the sincere sympathy of all. Deceased has not been well for months with some brain affection, and for a time it was thought he would recover, but latterly, the symptoms warned friends that the trouble would have a fatal issue. The funeral takes place to-day, Wednesday, to the English Church cemetery. The immediate relatives are, his lately widowed mother, one brother, William, and three sisters: Mrs. R. Adams, Holstein, Mrs. T. Wilson, Glenelg, and Mary at home. Robt. McCracken, Aberdeen, and Samuel in Durham, are uncles of deceased.

Thursday last after a year or two of delicate health, mercifully free from pain however, the summons came to the above lady. Unlike the preceding this was a sheaf of corn fully ripe, for she had passed her 84th year and had performed her full share of life's duties. The devoted husband, now left to finish life's journey alone was married to her twenty-three years ago. She was a Miss Anna Hatley and with her brother David lived respected for many years on the base line, 17th concession of Egremont. One brother Thos. is possibly alive at Dunedin, New Zealand.

The deceased was a consistent member of the Presbyterian church and in health delighted in the service of the sanctuary. The funeral took place on Monday at 10 a. m., Rev Mr Farquharson conducting a brief service at the house, where many friends of the deceased and her husband had collected to pay the last token of respect before the procession left for Amos Church, North Egremont, where a larger company of life-time neighbors and friends had assembled, Rev Mr Campbell conducted an appropriate service, and was assisted by the Durham pastor.
