That \$1.50 charged against Jno O'Brien be struck off, he having performed work; similarly \$2.50 was struck off Peter Sherwood, of Eugenia. Thos Aikinson was paid \$4 for gravel, Jas Oliver \$3.25, Jas Foster, a balance, \$1.50.

Gibson—Meads—That J C Wright's account of \$5.30 for tile used by overcoat opposite school house S S No 45, A and P., be paid.—Carried.

Gibson—Meads—That T Grainger be refunded \$2, being statute labor charged on lot 133, con 3, S W, in 1904, he having paid statute labor to the treasurer.—Carried.

Meads—Best—That the clerk be paid \$3 for drawing deed and making description re T M Baason to corporation.—Carried.

Best—Meads—That Alex Reid be refunded \$1 of statute labor charged to him on roll of 1904 for part lot 154, con 1 N E.—Carried.

Gibson—Purvis—That the township rate on lots 1 and parts 2 and 3, con 8, be refunded to Thos Symons, the owner, on account of the buildings having been burned.—Carried.

Gibson—Best—That the account of W H Thurston \$9.90 for balance of printing, be paid.—Carried.

Gibson—Best—That J P Ottowell's account for \$6 for services by order of local board of health be paid.—Carried.

Best—Meads—That the report of the reeve and Mr Gib-on on bridge expenditure be adopted, and that said committee be paid \$35, being 5 per cent on said expenditure.—Carried.—Advance
