**A VETERAN GONE.**—On Friday evening last, Dec. 30, Mr. Arch. McKie, one of the oldest of the pioneers, passed away at the residence of his son George at the patriarchal age of 90 years. He was born in Glasgow, Scotland in 1814, and while still a young man came out to America and spent some years in various parts. He returned to Scotland, married, and sailed for America again in 1840, shortly after his only son George had been born. He spent some time in New York State, then Waterbury, Conn. and in 1857 moved to Lot 66, Con. 2, Bentinck, where he lived until 10 years ago, and has since been a resident of Durham. His wife met her death 17 years ago by a deplorable accident while milking a cow. Deceased was one of a family of 6 bros. and 3 sisters, he being the last to go. He was a man of more than ordinary intelligence, he particularly well posted on all British affairs, and it was a treat to hear him recall the stirring incidents of the Cobden times. He was always a strong Reformer and an adherent of the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Farquharson conducted the services at his funeral on Monday, at which many old friends paid the last tribute. His only son George and his wife are chief mourners.

**VARNEY CHRISTMAS TREE.**—We have been furnished with an extended report of this Annual entertainment which we wish we could publish in full. We take space to note that the church was full, beautifully decorated, the two Christmas trees loaded with presents, the excellent program nearly all supplied by the children, prepared by the energetic teacher, Miss Blakburn. Addresses of welcome, recitations, duets, motion songs, choruses, drills, dialogues, &c., gave pleasing variety. Mr. Wm. Allan gave an address on "Responsibility." Treasurer Jas. Gray gave a very flattering report of the progress of the school. It was open 49 Sundays, average attendance 73, doing good work and a credit to Supt. John Aldred who for 17 years has been a devoted worker, and, while now retiring, must be gratified to leave the school in a flourishing condition. Pastor Masson ably filled the chair and contributed to the musical part of the program. Miss Blakburn was presented with a handsome fountain pen by the school, and the proceeds of the evening were about \$27. Among the number contributing to the Program were Percy Alford, A. Reeve Morice went in by acclamation. There was a run for the council but we have not particulars.

### BENTINCK.

Reeve Dickson as before and all his council by acclamation: Torry, Cronin, Grierson and Willis.

### DURHAM.

Mayor Hunter and council by acclamation: R. McFarlane, Sr., R. Cochrane, T. Moran, G. Sparring, John McGowan, Wm. Black.

### Trustees.

—E. Ward, Dr. Gun, unopposed; West Ward, Jas. Carson and W. Irwin, the former elected; North Ward, W. D. Mills and J. P. Telford, the former elected.

### THE BY-LAW.

The By-law received scant consideration and was defeated by 86 votes. This result is very largely due to Mr. Calder, who on Friday evening last, at a public meeting called by the Mayor, gave a lucid exposition of town finances, proving to the satisfaction of himself and a large number of others that no such by-law was needed at the present juncture. Mr. Laidlaw's influence is in the same direction, and they witness the result of their influence. It is reasonable to suppose that Mr. Calder will be ready to assist in the constructive work necessary to run the town without the aid of the borrowed money. Mr. Calder took the annual report and showed that the town was \$20,000 better off than it was last year. Mr. May's report was also very good and he was very successful in his latest legislation without any effort to protect it.

### Have we a council at all? is now the question.

By recent legislation it is necessary for candidates in cities at least, some say in towns also, to make a declaration of qualification within a hour as in many other places, and if his red tape be insisted on there must be a new election, and who so bold as predict the result?

### Mr. Carson again proved invincible for the trusteeship, and Mr. Mills was awarded the customary second term.

In the north ward the vote stood 49, 36; in the west ward 108, 76. The School Board for 1905 consists of Messrs Carson, Dr. Gun, Johnston, Mills, Ramage, Saunders, and their regular meetings are on the first Thursday of every month.

### COUNTY VOTE.

The chief interest centred in the commissioners, and many a wise and wide were the guesses at the winners. Each had their favorites, and three can extend sympathy to one another. What is gratifying is that all took a good vote in their home wards, Hanover beating all records in running up their first candidate, R. J. Ball, to the grand total of 640.

### The elections are over, and we'll all now settle down or brace up, or look into, or watch out for Jan. 25, according to our moods. Here are the figures as far as we know:
