Among other people of the north, in Russia, Scotland and Germany, this sport is entirely unknown, a fact that is somewhat extraordinary, considering that the sparksttotting can be employed in all countries in which the rigors of winter permit of the use of ordinary sleds. The sparkstotting is constructed entirely of Norway spruce. It is straight, of elongated form and weighs no more than thirty pounds. It consists of two runners, curved upyard in front, and six and one-half feet in length. To each of the runners is fixed an upright that serves both as a point of sup-port and a tiller. The entire affair is con-mected by two or three crosspieces, one of which supports a light seat placed twelve
