He spoke of the urgent necessity for increased school accommodation, and drew a conast between the school of 19 years ago het be first became trustee and the present. Then there was only three teachers now there were 9, with a necessity for 10 during Model School term. He pointed out that notwishstanding the increase, the rate to-day was several mills lower than in f rmer imes. This was owing to the increased grants from Government and County

equivalents. Secy Ramage then went into detail of income and expenditure since the be-ginning of 1903, showing the many kinds of expense besides the main one of teachers' Salaries. The expense in curred for the heating and ventilating system, was, including excavations, &c., over \$2120 09. Salaries in 1903, amounted to \$3086.00, in 1904 to \$3549, leaving out cents. Fuel in 1903 cost \$319.97, in 1904 to \$260. The grading and paving in 1904 cost \$220 70. Printing and advertising in 1903, \$38, in 1904, \$28. Supplies, including, chemicals, brooms, chalk, &c., cost in 1903. \$84.62, in 1904. \$54.59, while small improvements in 1903 were \$12.10, increased in 1904 to \$145.08 owing to the flooring of a room, new seats, &c., besides this there was a miscellaneous expenditure of \$36.65 and \$44.25 in the respective years. A total of over \$4440 in 1903, and of over \$5550


