Dr. Jamieson Elected. WHITNEY IS PREMIER. With a Very Large Majority. For better or for worse the country has made an unmistakable pronouncement against the Liberal Party, for of the 98 seats about 70 have gone to the Conservatives. The persistent cry of corruption, which we still believe to have been sporadic in character, has had its effect, the long period in power without doubt told against them, proving the truth of the old proverb "It's a long lane that has no turning," while errors of judgment, no less than such as the keeping of N. R. in no small measure to the decisive defeat. Besides there was the unique situation of opposition from both temperance and liquor men. That it is a decisive defeat is satisfactory, it is to be a defeat at all, for it will effectually prevent all intriguing, and all the vicious Conservatives to enter upon power with their whole energy centered on the administration of the Provincial domain. The Liberal party, beaten, but not dismayed, will accept the situation philosophically. They can proudly hold up their heads and hand over their charge to their opponents: A province free of debt, with a large cash surplus, Public Institutions in a healthy and efficient condition, a splendid start made in the development of New Ontario, with such a record in all departments, as will worthily employ the best talent on the conservative side to maintain. LOCALLY. Mr. McKeechie put up a valiant fight. His opponent was an old campaigner of 20 years standing, long in the field, he was only a few weeks in the majority. 100 days three years ago, and yet succeeded in pulling the majority down to about 550. The landslide in the country had its counterpart in the county, and though that does not account for every loss in the campaign, it was no slight influence. We again congratulate Dr. Jamieson, M. P. P., on his successful career; he has won his greatest victory. Without doubt he will be a notable strength to the new government, and will be as worthy a member as any to be found to the right of the Speaker. At this writing Premier Ross appears to have had a narrow escape. Dryden, Latchford, Harcourt, Egan and Gibson have all gone down, while the new ministers MacKay and Graham have retained popular favor. The three Wellingtons are Conservative, both Ottawa was Liberal, all Toronto of course, Conservative, South and Centre Bruce Conservative. It was a rousing victory, it is impossible to minimize it, and we shall now have the pleasure of sitting on the fence and seeing the other fellows run things. RECEIVING THE RETURNS. The result in the town, 144, was higher than the Liberals conceded, but not, it is said, up to expectations of the other side. When Hanover came in with only 87 it was certain that McKeechie was defeated, and gradually the Town Hall filled with a crowd becoming more enthusiastic as the evening went on. When the results were certain speech-making began, the hero of the hour receiving an ovation. Besides the candidate, brief addresses were given by Messrs. Wm. Irwin, John Brown, W. J. Young, Wm. Laidlaw, Inspector Campbell, Wm. Allan and others moderate in tone as regards the local campaign but vigorous enough on provincial shortcomings. Mr. McKeechie met many of his followers in Calder's Hall where returns were also received and discussed with something less of fervor than at the other place. How Hon. Mr. Ross and soon to be Hon. Mr. Whitney received the returns will appear shortly. The great landslide is one of the most notable in the history of the country, and as a pronouncement against corruption in the abstract has a great value. However, we still believe that Mr. Ross and his colleagues were victims rather than culprits, and though their "hour has come" at last, the country will yet be seen to do them honor for the great administrative capacity which kept them in power for over 32 years and leaving many worthy monuments behind them.
