The curability of tuberculosis is clearly in evidence in the records of the Muskoka Cottage Sanatorium, under the management of the National Sanitarium Association, and under whose auspices the new Free Consumptive Hospital has been built. In four years 510 patients have been treated, and more than 852 have been cured or so helped that they could ge back to work, caring for wife or child or those dependent upon them.

The new Free Consumptive Hospital is situated in Muskoka, not far from the Muskoka Cottage Sanatorium, the two gentlemen who have generously borne the cost of constructing the building desiring that the same benefits that have come to patients of the Muskoka Cottage Sanatorium, by virtue of its excellent situation, should go to the poorer patients, whose only hope is in admittance to the Free Consumptive Hospital

All that is wanting now is the furnishing of this Hospital with beds and other necessary appointments. The National Sanitarium Association, because of their heavy debt, are unable to undertake this part of the work. FIRE-DRILL IN SCHOOLS.

MR. EDITOR,-I beg leave to ask you to insert the following letter in regard to fire drill. It is giving my own candid opinion of the matter. Inside of one year three large schools in the city of Toronto were put out of business. The last one of these was on the 13 h. inst. 700 children were in the school gratifying statistics of the report of the session and from the matter furnished and the loss of life prevented, by the discipline acquired through a periodical fire drill.

> This requires frequent preparation that every teacher and pupil may know exactly what to do and may do it instantly from habit. No specific directions can be given because buildings are not alike in the number and position

> of their stairways and exits. In every school-building containing wo or more rooms, there should be a special fire signal known to teacher and pupils and capable of being heard throughout the building. At the sound of this signal every person should leave all other occupations and find his place in line for filing out. The files should be so organized and arranged as to facilitate the most rapid motion in order to reach the stairways and exits in the most direct way. The teachers should direct the movement of their own classes under the general direction of the prin-

INCOME OF THE FAMILY CUT OFF.

Appeal from Friends on Behalf of a Poor Consumptive.

The following letter from an eastern town, addressed to the Secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, Toronto, explains itself:- "What steps require to be taken to place a consumptive patient in the Free Consumption Hospital? We have a p or man here who has consumption. He has a wife and family of five children. He has been

sick and off work for four months already. The only source of income of the family has been cut off. I think the father would be better if he had the proper care, but here in the midst of his family it is impossible to give him proper treatment. If we can place him in the Consumption Hospital for care and treatment, then the people here can manage to look after the family until he is restored to health. He is able to go around, but is very weak."

We publish this letter to illustrate how great is the need for the Free Hospital for Poor Consumptives, established by the National Sanitarium Association at Muskoka. Just one year ago the first patient -a woman from Napanee was admitted into the hospital, and since then 168 patients have found a home within its walls. A great number of these are wholly unable to pay anything towards their maintenance, whilst the average from those who pay is less than one-half the cost of maintenance.

There is no endowment, and the Trustees depend solely in the making up of the large deficit each month on the contributions of kind friends. With the increasing numbers seeking admission to the hospital, should the sub-criptions continue to run short, as they have been doing for the past three months. the Trustees will have no recourse open to them but to close some of the wards. Sir Wm. R Meredith, Kt., Vice-President of the Association, and Mr W. J. Gage. Chairman of the Executive Committee will receive subscriptions for this much needed work.




