A LESSON IN THE MARKET.

Young housekeepers will discover a fund of information in the papers contributed to The Delineator by Isabel Gordon Curtis under the title "The Making of a Housewife," giving in the March number a lesson in the meat market. The hints are practical and helpful. Other topics of domestic interest, especially during the Lenten season, are "Attractive Fish for Lenten Days," illustrating and describing a number of delicate ways of preparing fish, and a variety of recipes under the headings "Fruit and Vegetable Salads," "Codfish Variations," and "Eggs—from a Hygienic Standpoint."

His policy at Guelph Agricultural College has always been progressive; and his experiments and enquiries into matters of interest to the farming community have been constant and valuable. It is a pity that the services of such a man cannot be retained for the people in some way.—Montreal Star. (Conservative)

Agricultural Society Exhibitions.

The leading Agricultural societies of the Province are evincing considerable interest in the suggestions made by Mr. H. B. Cowan, Provincial Superintendent of Agricultural societies, that the number of exhibitions held annually in Ontario should be materially reduced, and that the Agricultural societies should receive their grants in proportion to the amounts they expend for agricultural purposes. Such a change would do away with all distinction between the township and district societies.

The proposed reduction is matter of common remark every fall season. "Too many shows" trips lightly off the tongue, but to be practical, which one of them is going to drop out? Not the South Grey Show certainly, with its active Board, fine grounds and buildings, and fairly judicious distribution of prizes. Besides would Mr. Cowan dare throw a damper on the delightful experience of seeing and being seen on the best annual outing of the year; where as nowhere else, the youth of both sexes pair in public and mix their love and lolly pops while they gaze on fruits and roots and buns and butter. No Sir, hands off S. Grey.

Then there's the World's fair, Holstein. Will Mr. Cowan, if you know what's good for you, don't propose to wipe off this within the precincts of the township. It stands unique. Where else can you roam the woods and find the ruses on the trees and horses and heifers on the other end? Who would miss the delightful crush in the hall as you are borne on amidst a wealth of women's work and the best of the best in the township? Let Holstein stand. And would anyone dare to suggest Priceville? Growing from year to year—with the best sheep in the country, splendid young horses, fine building and grounds, supported by four townships? No, Priceville must go on. And then there's Bensinck and Normanby and Glenelg shows, each with some vital element that simply cannot go. Mr. Cowan must look elsewhere.

Another good thing is that progressive farmers prepare themselves to show at several fairs the best of their stock and produce, and these exhibits are educational in proportion as they are seen.

THE ONTARIO CABINET.

We announced last week that Mr. Whitney had received his commission, to form a government. He was prepared at once, and submitted the following names and all have been duly sworn in:

Premier and Attorney General, J. P. Whitney.

Commissioner of Crown Lands, J. J. Foy, K. C.

Minister of Education, Dr. Pyne.

Provincial Secretary, W. J. Hanna.

Provincial Treasurer, Col. Matheson.

Minister of Agriculture, Nelson Montith.

Minister of Public Works, Dr. Reame.

Ministers without Portfolio, Adam Beck, Dr. Willoughby, Major Hendrie.

It will be seen that in a few respects this list differs from any of the guesses made, notably the Minister of Education. However a re-arrangement is promised before long, and in the meantime they return to their constituencies for re-election on Feb. 21st, polling if any one week later.

Toronto, as will be seen gets two members and the others are distributed fairly well geographically. Some one has pointed out that not one of the ministers with portfolios could pass an examination on the Shorter Catechism meaning that the new cabinet has no Presbyterian in its ranks! It comprises 4 Anglicans, 2 Roman Catholics and 1 Methodist but no one supposes Presbyterians and Baptists have been purged however, how largely religion enters into partyism when the most brilliant men of a party such as we think have been chosen are found in one church. Last census showed Methodists leading in Ontario with 606,388, Presbyterians 477,380, Roman Catholics 300,304, Anglicans 307,367, Baptists 116,231. We mention these facts merely to show that if denominationalism is to count in cabinets there would have to be a considerable re-arrangement. The cry has been raised in the past but we hope the day is far distant when public service must be measured by such a test.

The New Premier.

James Pliny Whitney, K.C. L.L.D. M.P.P., the new Premier, was born at Williamsburg, Ontario, on October 2, 1843. He was educated at the Cornwall Grammar School, studied law in the office of John Sandfield MacDonald, was called to the Bar in 1876, and received silk in 1880. His first attempt to enter political life was unsuccessful, Dr. Chamberlain defeating him in Dundas at the general election of 1886 by 25 votes. Dr. Chamberlain was unseated in 1888, and Mr. Whitney was returned at the bye-election. Dundas has ever since been a faithful to Mr. Whitney as he has been loyal to Dundas, he being the popular choice at the general elections of 1890, 1894, 1898, 1902, and 1905. In April, 1896, the new Premier was the unanimous selection in the legislature in succession to Mr. G. F. Marter. Mr. Whitney intimated vigor not only in his followers at Queen's Park, but gradually wore the Liberal party in the country down, and in 1898, only two years after assuming his new position as chief, Premier Hardy was returned by a narrow majority, whilst it will still be fresh in the public mind how in 1902 Premier Ross had a somewhat fictitious renewal of power by a majority of two and a minority of the popular vote of over 7,000. In 1899 Mr. Whitney was appointed a member of the committee to revise the Ontario statutes, and an important piece of legislation for which he was directly responsible was a Bill for punishment of bribery by imprisonment. He is a staunch adherent of the Anglican Church, and a delegate to the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa. He received the degree of L.L.D. from Toronto University on June 13, 1902. Mr. Whitney was married April 3, 1877, to Alice, third daughter of Mr. William M. Park, of Cornwall. He is a lieutenant-colonel of the reserve militia, and as a member of the volunteers, he was on duty five months during the Fenian trouble in 1866.
