TEMPERANCE VOTE IN ONTARIO.

Perhaps no element of the Ontario electorate was the result of the recent contest in that province a matter of greater surprise than the temperance vote. If the reports which are now coming from Ontario accurately indicate the feeling of the leaders of the Prohibition party they have already come to the conclusion that they have made a very great mistake in displaying such hostility to the Ross Government prior to the election and such consistency in recording the votes of their people at the polls against its candidates.

They, no doubt expected that Mr. Whitney might secure a majority of the seats in the Legislature, and even be able to form a government with which the business of the country could be carried on for the next four years. They would have regarded it as a triumph for themselves had the Conservatives secured a majority of eight or ten. In such a result their weight would have been manifest, and it would have given an assurance that the balance of power in the country lay with them, and that at the next general election, four years hence, the parties would have to bid for their vote. A majority of forty for Mr. Whitney has however given an entirely different complexion to the matter. It has created a general impression that in a party election the temperance vote and temperance sentiment cuts little or no figure.

Accordingly, as matters have turned out, they have lost a government which was disposed to make every concession to them which it could make safely. They have assisted in overthrowing a Premier who was one of themselves in his private life and refused to grant their utmost demands because he could not do so and retain a very necessary part of his political following; who had, however, at a convention of his party outlined a platform which promised them a very liberal share of the reform they sought.

The Government which will succeed is bound to them in no way whatsoever. Its leaders are not recognised as in sympathy with the movement which they represent. Not only has no bargain been made, but no promises, even to consider the question of temperance legislation will embarrass the new administration. Mr Whitney's Government is entirely at liberty to rebuff any appeals which may come from any temperance source, no matter how mild or how reasonably couched these appeals may be. He owes no good wishes to the temperance party. Many adherents of the Prohibition faith undoubtedly recorded their votes for his candidates but they were voting not for any government of which he might be the head but against the government led by Mr. Ross. Those who did not vote at all or voted for temperance candidates indicated still further their want of confidence in him. On the other hand, he received very considerable aid, and very cordial support, from the interests which they seek to destroy, from the liquor traffic, and in common gratitude he may be expected to consider these interests in preference to the cause of temperance reform.

But, perhaps the greatest blow which they invited is the seeming assurance which has been given that in political contests their vote is an important one, and we may be sure that in future elections this will be remembered to their disadvantage. It is not too much, probably, to say that prohibition in Ontario has received a setback for years to come.—From a Vancouver paper.

The following communications were read: From York county council re turning automobiles on highway; manager Bank of Hamilton, re making fund to said bank; petition of J. B. Thibodeau et al re union school with part of Glenelg; Thomas Mercer, re forming a union school with part of Euphrata. Bylaws 647, to appoint an arbitrator in the matter of a union school with part of Euphrata, were introduced and read a first and second time and in committee of the whole on the third reading Bylaw 647 was filled up with the name of William McLoughrey, and Bylaw 648 with the name of W. J. Bellamy.

McKenzie-Carson—That this council now go into committee to finally audit the auditors' report.—Carried.

McKenzie-Purvis—That the resolve issue order in favor of James Williams for \$11.51 being amount overpaid treasurer on Collector's roll, 1904, as per auditor's report.—Carried.

Carson—Best—That the reeve and clerk be a committee to inquire into the sufficiency and validity of the treasurer's bond.—Carried.

McKenzie-Carson—That the Standard Fuel Co. be notified by the clerk to remove their wood, now an obstruction on the valley road.—Carried.

McKenzie—Best—That the auditors' report as finally audited by this council be adopted and that 150 copies be printed for distribution.—Carried.

Carson—McKenzie—That Joseph Gibson be paid \$8.87 for repairing roads by order of reeve.—Carried.

McKenzie-Purvis—That the caretaker's bill for lamps, \$2, be paid.—Carried.

Carson—Best—That John Hales be paid \$1.50, his account for moving Thos. Manders and wife to House of Refuge.—Carried.

Carson—McKenzie—That the auditors be paid their salary, \$10 each.—Carried.
