

Transmuting Vegetables. The discovery of a means of metamor phosing radishes into potatoes has been made in so solemn a place as the Academy of Sciences, Paris. M. Molliard takes a very strong radish, "Pasteurizes" it in a certain way, and it grows up into a fine potato. More scientifically, the young radish is cultivated in a glass retort, after a process invented by Pasteur, in a concentrated solution of glucose. Starch then develops plentifully in the cells of the radish, which swells
