Farmers' Institute. THE FARMER'S SON.

We must have a high ideal of the farm boy, the hope of the country, and too often farmers themselves give a false impression of the nobility of the calling in the presence of their boys.

The speakers present were W. F. Kydd, Simcoe, and G. Barbour. Cross Hill, and both gentlemen were thoroughly competent exponents of the topics they respectively chose. Mr. Kydd is an authority on horse flesh and his address on "Am I raising the most profitable horse?" had many good points, the eye as well as the ear being instructed by the use of charts and diagrams.

The farmer must, said the speaker, use brains in selection, the individuality of the animal should be regarded first, then the pedigree. Nothing but pure bred should be used, always remembering that a pure bred scrub is the worst animal possible to breed from. Bay, brown or dark chestnut were favorite colors, you can choose your stallion but not your mare generally.

The first thing to watch in selecting a horse is his wind, next, has he good feet, front feet round, the frog—the cushion of the feet—in good shape, a sloping pastern better than upright, flat leg preferable to round leg, puffy locks was the beginning of hog spavin, ringbone, &c. Hog spavin he dreaded worse than bone spavin as there were more bones affected by the former.

In a lucid, convincing way he went over the whole horse, showing by the diagrams and explanation the good points from head to hindmost heel. It was a practical lesson that a newspaper report however ample can not reproduce, and compels the belief that farmers as a class have not yet discovered the Farmers' Institute, or the Town Hall would not nearly accommodate those who might, could, would and should learn much to their advantage.

Mr. Barbour followed on "Beef Cattle," setting forth as an axiom that the "animal must be a machine to convert food products into cash." To this end animals should be selected that put on fat in places that bring the highest priced cuts, and these were shown in an interesting diagram of a fat beast with prices ranging from 3c to 16c a lb. Depth and width of body, carried well back to the tail were desirable; there should be indications of good lung power, a large nostril and bright eye; and it should be possible to pick up a handful of flesh in any part of the body.

Four points to success in breeding beef cattle were: 1—to discriminate against the dairy sire. 2—Stick to one line of breeding. Hereford, Polled Angus or Durham being the best breeders. 3—Have a general purpose cow. 4—Generous feeding. Continuous growth in the calf was necessary to produce the best "baby beef," and he considered the fall the best season to have cows come in.

Let there be a good sun-sweetened bite of grass, before allowing them out in spring, make change gradually. Much depends on the feeder, regularity, &c and time spent in grooming is well spent. Sweep down the cobwebs, let the sunshine into the stables, and use the palm of the hand instead of the boot toe to admonish.

He would feed only twice a day, roughage in the morning with meal and pulped roots on before breakfast, water after breakfast and supply them with clover hay, allowing no one except a buyer to disturb them till evening when a similar routine is followed. All feed except clover hay should be cut.

FOALS AND FOALING. Mr. Kydd followed with an intensely practical address on foaling time. He preferred fall colts where mare could not be used in winter. Mares should be worked every day avoiding wagon tongues and heavy backing. Tame horses should be turned out every day in winter if not working. Roomy box stalls should be provided for foaling mares and it was more important than formerly to be with them, and mares that lose milk days before birth should have a dose of alces given them. Have shoes taken off mares before foaling time. Very minutely he outlined the care and steps necessary at the birth of the foal.

As to training the foal should not be allowed to follow mare at work, should exercise the greatest care at first haltering, always remembering too that a bad tempered man makes a bad tempered horse. Don't let them stand on a foot of manure, feed bran and oats, be worked every day (flax seed was good), all they can eat it allowed exercise and harness them a few times before working, always attaching them to some steady-going mate when first doubled up.

THE EVENING MEETING. Mayor Hunter in the chair opened with a few flattering remarks as to the part farmers had taken in assisting town industries, gloried in being a farmer himself, and was highly pleased with the success of the day sessions. Mr. Wm. Ramage, as on former occasions, contributed of his musical talent opening the programme with "Simon the Cellarer," and being warmly endorsed responded with "The Guardship." He was followed by MR. BARBER who congratulated the town on having a farmer for Mayor, first he had found, rehearsed the benefits of membership in Farmers' Institutes, such as the bulletins issued regularly, rounds of Guelph Fair, &c. He dealt briefly with some of the salient points of the Guelph show and entered on his topic.
